BOOKS AND MAGAZINES.

No other writer, unless it be Eva Emery Dye, has written a story of such absorbing interest to Oregonians as has Emerson Hough, author of "The Way of a Man" and "The Mississippi Bubble," with his "54-49, or Fight." The Oregonian reviews the book at great length and commends it with enthusiasm, saying in part, "A romance of the Oregon country, with the hero's cabin on the outskirts of this city"—meaning Portland. "As a story, it is American through and through"—a burning epic of democracy." The biggest historical figure is John Calhoun, selected by the author as an advocate of American expansion. "Texas ours—Oregon ours—or fight."

Calhoun is made to say: "For my own part, I agree with Polk that we ought to own that country (Oregon) to fifty-four forty—but what we ought to do and what we can do are two separate matters. Should we force the issue now and lose, we should lose a hundred years. Should we advance firmly and hold firmly what we gain, in perhaps less than 100 years we may win all of that country, to the river Saskatchewan—I know not where. In my own soul I believe no man may set a limit to the growth of the idea of an honest government by the people. And this continent is meant for honest government. Had I fewer politicians and more women behind me, we should have Texas to the Rio Grande, and Oregon up to Russia, and all without a fight."

Magazines. The March issue of the American will contain a short story by Irving Bacheler, author of "Eben Holden," "Dri and I," etc.

Besides Emily Post's story of international marriage, the March Everybody's will be made interesting by an exposure of Wall street methods and Charles Sommerville, one of the reporters who sat through the Thaw trial, will make some suggestions about our jury system.

Mrs. Humphrey Ward's new novel "Marriage à la Mode" is now running in McClure's. In the March number the scene of the story will be shifted to England. The leading special article will describe the effects of alcohol on all human activities, entitled, "The Verdict of Science Against Alcohol." The article is written by M. A. Ross, professor of organic chemistry at Clark university.

The Red Book for March will not appear until February 23. It will contain in addition to its stories and portrait studies, two articles of far more than ordinary interest. The first of these, by Professor Frederick Steyer, who is perhaps the foremost anthropologist of America, is concerned with the contrast between women of savagery and civilization. Edwin Markham, of "The Man With the Hoe" fame, has written to "Women Who Worry."
