

Size of the Dividend.

The dividend to be issued in March will be 40 per cent at the lowest, and may reach 45 per cent, but not likely the 50 per cent mark. With 40 per cent payments, the sum to be distributed will be \$194,000 and if 45 per cent dividends then \$186,000, as the total liabilities are \$226,600, approximately.
