LOST GOODS

Another dray load of stolen merchandise was delivered to the officers this morning by Charles Dickens, the confessed thief of the O. R. & N. railway company, says the Pendleton East Oregonian of Wednesday. In speaking of the wholesale thefts uncovered recently. It contained a double set of heavy harness and a single set, besides one or two other articles. These articles were delivered voluntarily by Dickens, the dray being sent and paid for by himself.

Dickens has for the last two days been engaged in writing a complete confession, in the office of District Attorney Phelps. When the paper has been completed it is expected to bring out some other complications of a sensational nature. Mr. Schuyler intimates that there are other implications.

New Tobacco Union.

Louisville, Ky., Feb. 18.—Pledges secured from tobacco growers in the Burley districts of Kentucky, Indiana and Wisconsin will be brought up for ratification in a meeting of a joint committee of tobacco associations in Louisville today. Agents of the new Union Tobacco society, now a reality, will go over all the districts included in the new central association of tobacco societies, to interest the growers in the federation and to secure their pledges for 1909. Tobacco growers in Kentucky, Indiana and Wisconsin are brought together by this union association. The Union Tobacco society, as now constituted, is more a pooling of Burley tobacco interests than a general trust of tobacco-growing associations. Owing to the fact that the Planters Protective Association, which dominates the dark tobacco market, and the Burley Tobacco society, which dominates the Burley market, are compelled to deal largely with different sets of buyers, it is stated that the present Union Tobacco

society does not represent a coalition between them in the new union organization.

CHARGE MAY WITH FRAUD

Baker City, Feb. 17.—Charges of fraud and of obtaining money under false pretense are made against Dr. W. J. May, representing the Hot Springs company, owners of the Radium Springs at Haines, and Paralee F. Hindman of Baker City, in a complaint filed in the circuit court today by C. P. Murphy and Gustav Anderson, in the case wherein Thomas C. Burke is plaintiff and Paralee F. Hindman, M. J. Hindman, her husband, and the Hot Springs company are defendants. The suit involves notes to the amount of \$5000 and a mortgage on 160 acres of land, which are alleged to have been fraudulently given.
