MEEKER IN LIMELIGHT

Salem, Feb. 17.—Ezra Meeker and A. Atwood, two of the best known Oregon pioneers, were in the city yesterday, looking up data of Oregon's pioneer buildings built by Jason Lee at Chamboog, in which he taught Christianity and letters to the Indian children, and the few white children in that colony. Their object is to reproduce the building for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, held in Seattle this summer. It is expected that this will be one of the most interesting of Oregon's buildings at the fair. This building is being backed by the Methodist church, financially, and during the fair, one day will be given entirely to them. Members of the Epworth Leagues of the United States and Canada will hold their quadrennial convention during the fair, and will be addressed by Senator Dooliver, Senator Jones, and other prominent speakers. Ezra Meeker will erect a building which he will call "The Pioneer," and in which he will make cloth at the old-fashioned loom. He will also have a barbecue every day. Mr. Meeker has been over the old Oregon trail twice, and is now trying to have congress mark the trail.

Y. M. C. A. DISCUSSED

COMMITTEE ENLARGED TO TWENTY-FIVE IN SESSION.

Meeting Held Last Night to Aid in Reaching Decision on Weighty Matter—Must Accept One of Two Plans Before March 2—Rent Plan Not Desirable One.

There was a representative meeting held last evening in the parlors of the Commercial club, to consider the feasibility of attempting to secure a Young Men's Christian association in this city. Several days ago Secretary Rhodes, for Oregon and Idaho, presented the matter in a public meeting, at which time a committee was appointed to ascertain the general sentiment and probable support of such an institution. This committee met last Sunday afternoon and decided to enlarge the committee to 25, and this committee met last evening.

Two propositions are being considered, whether or not to build or rent. This is a very important feature to decide from the start.

The history of the movement shows that a much larger percentage of these institutions fail which occupy rented quarters than those who own their own homes. Committees were appointed last night to inquire as to what equipment would be required to cover the needs of this city, and to report at a meeting to be held Sunday, the 25th. About March 2 Secretary Rhodes will return to La Grande, at which time the matter will be definitely decided whether or not to attempt the undertaking.

Pendleton's Dogs Untaxed.
The facts have developed that the law of the city of Pendleton assessing a tax against dogs, \$2 for males and \$3 for females, is not being enforced, and practically no collections have been made during the past year. During all of last year, only \$15 in taxes was paid into the city coffers, and these payments were made by dog owners who went into the municipal building and paid the dog tax voluntarily.—Pendleton Tribune.
