There will be no general leave for officers or men until after Monday's review, but it is stated that on the fleet's arrival the officers will receive short leave of half an hour to greet their families and friends at Old Point.

The tentative program for Monday's great reception provides that promptly at 11 o'clock the flagship Connecticut will lead the column of battleships past the Tail of the Horseshoe at the entrance to the Roads. The battleships will steam in review past the president's yacht Mayflower, which will be anchored in the Roads.

At 1:30 o'clock the fleet will be ready to drop anchor. One hour later Admiral Sperry, his staff and the captains of the battleships will go aboard

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the Mayflower to pay their respects to President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Navy Newberry.

The president of the United States, cabinet officers, several of the justices of the supreme court, officials of both houses of congress, officers of the army and of the navy, and thousands of plain citizens will be on the Virginia shore to cheer the incoming ships.

There will be plenty of noise and color when the Connecticut leads the way into the Roads. The ships of the fleet will be dressed with flags and their bands will play, first the "Star Spangled Banner," and then "Home, Sweet Home" and then the "Star Spangled Banner" again. Every house within sight of the sea will make a brave showing of bunting.

The welcoming ships will be dressed out as are the home-coming ships, and from the turrets of the vessels gathered for the greeting the guns will speak in salute, to be answered by the guns of the boats of Sperry's command.

The ancient, but now modernized, stronghold, Fortress Monroe, guards the western approaches to Chesapeake Bay and the broad waters leading to the James river. Time has not sapped the strength of the old fort. The smooth bores of other days have given place to rifled cannon, and the old signal torch has dwindled its beams under the rays of the electric searchlight. Fortress Monroe will fly its flags February 22, and its great guns will roar peacefully, when the ships come home.
