EXTRA SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE NECESSARY

Portland, Feb. 22.—A special in the Oregonian relates the following:

A special session of the Oregon legislature will be necessary, or senate bill No. 254, a bill appropriating \$350,000 for improvements at state institutions will fail to become a law. Owing to irregularities the bill was not legally passed, and is invalid. The special session, if called, will merely pass the bill in the form in which it was intended to be passed by the session just closed.

No special session has been called and none will be unless 20 members of the senate and 40 members of the house signify their willingness to come to Salem for a special session without expense to the state. This decision was reached at a conference tonight between Governor Chamberlain, President Bowerman, Speaker McArthur and Senator Kay. Senator Kay has undertaken to get the members to agree to come and believes he can do so. President Bowerman will not ask the members to come together on this condition, though they say they are willing to come themselves at their own expense.

Replies by Wire Asked.
"Every members of the legislature

who is willing to come on that condition is asked to wire the governor at once that he will be here," said Senator Kay this evening. "The telegrams can be sent 'collect,' as we have made arrangements to have the charges paid. What we want is immediate assurance that a quorum will be present. Of course, we do not expect those in remote districts to return if they have gone to their homes."

The bill which the legislature failed to pass legally is senate bill 254, by the ways and means committee. It appropriates \$250,000 for a new wing, equipment, fire protection, etc., at the asylum, \$17,500 for improvements at the penitentiary; \$7800 for improvements at the blind school, \$57,500 for new buildings at the institution for feeble-minded, \$8000 for the Soldiers' home and \$4000 for the reform school. Governor Chamberlain is not asking the members of the legislature to come without pay or to promise to come without pay. He is taking no part in the special session movement, but told the members who called upon him that he would call a session if the members wished him to do so on that condition.

MALADY SPREADS

Fourteen horses are dead and two more are down and not expected to live as the result of the fatal malady that has attacked the horses of William Mills of Juniper, says the East Oregonian. This peculiar epidemic appeared several days ago and in a very short time, six of them had died. Their hindquarters seemed to be first affected and they would stiffen. Then the horses would lie down, stretch out the muscles of their hindquarters become as hard as iron and in a short time they would be dead. Telephone messages were sent in this morning for medical aid and this evening Dr. H. C. Pinkerton will leave for the Juniper country to investigate

the matter. The horses will be opened and a chemical examination made, and a diagnosis taken as to the peculiar malady.

The deaths that have occurred are thought to be the result of eating some poisonous plant or weed in the pasture. A number of fine animals have been lost and considerable anxiety has been felt by the other farmers for fear that the disease may be contagious. The cause, however, will likely be known when the chemical analysis is made of the stomachs and intestines of the dead animals.
