The rules committee and faculty representative from the La Grande high school to the eastern Oregon conference, meets tomorrow and Saturday, met last evening and with the assistance of James F. Wall, drew up a set of rules and regulations to be presented to the conference when it convenes. Other delegations have done the same thing and when the meeting is called to order, there will be something to work with. This was done to facilitate matters when the conference is called and not to dictate to the conference.

The rules drawn up last evening are exhaustive and will serve as patterns for a large scope of rules. It is to be expected that chances will occur, but the primary object is to form a nucleus with which to work as soon as the meeting is called. All the schools invited have now responded with letters, saying either representatives or proxies will be here tomorrow or Saturday morning.

LIBRARY PROMISED

The Dalles, Feb. 24.—Ground will be broken within a few weeks for the erection of a Carnegie library in The Dalles.

Mayor E. M. Wingate received a message from the Home Trust company of Hoboken, N. J., today, stating that the money which Andrew Carnegie gave to this city for the library about a year ago, is still available. The contract with E. E. Angell, who was awarded the work at the last meeting of the city council for the building of the structure, will be signed by Mayor Wingate and City Recorder J. M. Filloon as soon as a conference with the contractor can be arranged and then work on the erection of the building will be commenced at once.

While the work of erecting the building was awarded to E. E. Angell of Portland, at the regular February meeting of the councilmen, it was deemed advisable to ascertain if the money was still deposited in the banking institution for The Dalles library before the contract was signed. Mr. Wingate wired the Trust company, asking if the money was available and stated that the bid had been accepted for the structure.

Florida "Negro Day."
Tampa, Fla., Feb. 25.—Today the negroes of Florida are in charge of the state fair, which has been in progress on the spacious Tampa Bay hotel grounds for the past three weeks. On the program for this afternoon is Booker T. Washington and other men of his race who have won distinction and aided in the enlightening of their race. In the main exhibit hall is a department set aside for exhibits of produce and industrial accomplishments of the race and this has attracted considerable favorable comment from visitors from the north and west.
