BAKER NAMES DELEGATES

The Baker City high school will take a determined stand for cleaner athletics at the Eastern Oregon Inter-Scholastic conference, which will be held in La Grande tomorrow. Superintendent Churchill, representing the high school faculty, and George Jett and Elmer Hall as delegates from the student body, will attend the meeting.

One of the first things to be asked will be the adoption of the four-year rule, preventing any student from representing his school in a contest wherein he has been previously for four years entered.

An age limit of 21 years will also be asked, barring any student that has passed that birthday from representing his school in the conference games.

In order to insure the playing of only bona fide students the local delegation will ask that no student that enters school after the third week of the first term be eligible in athletic contests. Neither will a student be allowed to enter athletic events unless he has attended school regularly from the date of his entrance.

The post-graduates will also be barred under a rule submitted by the local delegation, and a rule will be asked barring any coach or trainer from participation in any contest as an official.

Probably one of the most important things to come up before the conference will be the selection of the board of arbitration before which all protests of alleged ineligibility or regarding officials' rulings will be brought.

EXPECTING TROUBLE.

Heny's Bodyguard is on the Alert—No Jury.

San Francisco, Feb. 25.—An undercurrent of unrest prevails in the Calhoun trial. It is reported that trouble of some kind is momentarily expected. Heny's bodyguards are on the alert. Everybody entering the court room is closely scrutinized. No prospects of getting a jury. Twelve hundred veniremen have been examined and only 10 temporary jurors are in the box.
