## COUNTY JAIL STANDS EMPTY OF PRISONERS

For the first time in two years and a half, the county jail is without an inmate. Rube Chandler was removed by the jury verdict of "not guilty." Tom Maxwell has been taken to Salem and thus is cleaned off the entire population of the county jail.

About a year ago the population fell off, but never quite reached empty.

## UNION COUNTY ASSESSED VALUATION \$6,000,000. MORE

Under the new emergency tax law rearrangement of assessments, Union county's state assessed valuation is nearly \$6,000,000 above the original assessment about \$7,000,000, making a total assessable valuation in Union county of \$12,000,000. This sharp increase will mean that Union county will add just \$1000 to the apportionment paid into the state coffers. A Salem dispatch throws interesting light on the tax situation in this state: The state board of equalization today completed its equalization of the assessments of the several counties on the rolls of 1908 and apportioned the state taxes among the several counties on the basis of valuations as equalized.

This new apportionment has been made under the emergency tax law, known as house bill 190. In the equalization of assessments, Baker county's valuations were increased \$5,000,000, Benton \$5,000,000, Clackamas \$6,000,000, Lane \$7,000,000, Lane \$7,000,000, Linn \$7,000,000, Marion over \$2,000,000, Polk \$6,000,000, Union nearly \$6,000,000, Wasco \$5,000,000, Washington \$4,000,000, Yamhill, \$8,000,000.

The principal reductions in valuations are, Columbia \$9,000,000, Coos

\$2,000,000, Douglas \$2,000,000, Jackson nearly \$9,000,000, Multnomah \$46,000,000, Tillamook \$5,000,000.

These changes in assessment, given in round numbers, are believed to bring the property of the several counties to a uniform rate of valuation. As compared with the amount required of them by the January apportionment, the following counties will be required to pay more by the new apportionment; the amounts being in round numbers: Baker \$1400, Clatsop \$4000, Columbia \$1500, Curry \$1000, Douglas \$2000, Hood River \$3000, Klamath \$5500, Lincoln \$1100, Morrow \$1500, Multnomah \$7000, Sherman \$1000, Tillamook \$3000, Umatilla \$3000, Union \$1000, Wallowa \$1000, Wasco \$2700.

The counties that find their apportionments reduced are: Benton \$2400, Crook \$1000, Grant \$2000, Harney \$4000, Jackson \$2000, Lane \$2000, Linn \$7000, Marion \$5500, Polk \$3,000, Washington \$3000, Wheeler \$2,000, Yamhill \$7000.

The equalization of assessments is effective only for state taxation and does not change the valuations for county taxation.

## SEEK HOME FOR CHILD

A mysterious tiny baby girl, born night before last, of good parentage, a healthy baby, and a good disposition, is to be given into the care of some good family to be raised properly and is now at the home of Dr. T. M. Henderson, where it will be kept until a good home can be found for the child, relates the Pendleton East Oregonian.

The reason for giving the child away is that the parents don't want the child. Beyond this Dr. Henderson refuses to state any of the particulars. While out on one of his professional visits the child was born and the mother asked the doctor to take the baby and find a home for it. This the doctor is attempting to do and if no suitable place can be found the doctor and his wife will keep it themselves. The baby is a fine, healthy child and the doctor will vouch for its parentage, but beyond this he refuses to make any statement. A number of callers have been to see the child and applications have been made for the baby, but it has not been given to any one so far.

## ORIENTAL BURIED RIGHT

Rev. George T. Ellis returned last evening from Baker City where he was called to preach the first Christian funeral sermon over the remains of a Chinaman in Baker county. During the 11 years' pastorate in Baker City

Rev. Ellis was instrumental in converting 11 Chinamen, all of whom became members of his church and this is the first funeral of any of the members of the class. The church was filled and the audience included no less than 50 Chinamen, who were greatly impressed with the services. The deceased man was about 50 years of age.
