OTHERS IMPLICATED BY THOSE WHO ARE ARRESTED

Pendleton, Feb. 25.—District Attorney Phelps has been busy for the last few days securing evidence in the railroad cases against Dickens, Edwards and Ely. The cases were to come up before the justice last Saturday, but the prosecuting attorney has not made his preparations complete for the hearing. A number of subpoenas have been issued and examinations have been made in the district attorney's office behind closed doors.

It is said that dozens of persons in the city have been implicated by Dickens and among them some very prominent people. According to wild rumors there have been thousands and

thousands of dollars' worth of merchandise sold in Pendleton, which has gone to some of the most prominent merchants.

Rumors have also been afloat that Dickens has implicated a number of people to their faces in the presence of Phelps, and that when the accusation had been denied that trouble occurred. It is expected that there will be some interesting proceedings when the trial comes off. That people who have been here, and who have moved away have been subpoenaed and the district attorney is waiting their appearance before conducting the trial, is the reason assigned for the delay.

Funeral of Joel Crandall.

The funeral of the late Joel Crandall took place from the family residence this afternoon at 2 o'clock, Pastor W. H. Gibson, of the First Baptist church, officiating. Many sympathetic friends tendered affectionate expressions of interest. Mr. Crandall was one of the honored pioneers whose ranks are rapidly thinning. He was born in the state of Vermont January 24, 1825. In 1863 he was united in marriage to Miss Martha Jane Ellis. To them were born four children, L. B. Crandall of Spokane, Mrs. Minna J. Blake of Baker City, George A. and T. Ellis Crandall of Spokane. These, with the mother, survive to mourn their loss. All were present at the funeral hour.

The family migrated to the west in 1873 and settled at Ladd Canyon, where they resided two years, then removed to the present home on Fourth and D streets. The deceased came to a peaceful death at 11:15 p. m., February 24, surrounded by relatives and friends who rendered every service that love and skill could devise. The interment took place in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

Thus an honored citizen, kind father and useful man, after years of declining strength, yielded to the common foe, and has joined the innumerable hosts who have fought life's battles and entered upon the eternal reward. The family has the sympathy of a vast multitude of friends.

COMMITTEE REPORT FAVORABLE

Sundry Civil Appropriations Bill is Given Praying by Committee.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The house today agreed to a conference report on the postoffice appropriation bill. Representative Tawney introduced in the house a special rule, adopted by 140 to 60, providing for consideration of amendments to the sundry civil appropriation bills. The amendments would prevent all appropriations for commissions, councils and boards created by the president, and also prevent any clerks being detailed from the government departments to duty in connection with such boards. The question now goes to the committee of the whole.
