# WIRELESS IN BAKER

Baker City, Feb. 27.—The Oregonian published a story last evening which says that in an interview with E. T. Booth, who was in the city last night, he informed us that he was authorized to announce to the people of Baker City that the United States government erect in this city one of the light wireless stations provided for in Oregon this year. In addition to the several stations already in operation in the state, Pendleton and The Dalles also get stations, the headquarters of Walla Walla College and Spokane in Washington, and Victor, Boise, Lewiston and Moscow in Idaho, will be equipped, making a complete line of stations in the principal cities. Orders have already been given to the manufacturing department of the company for the wireless apparatus, and as fast as the stations are completed they will be put in operation in competition with the wire lines. Mr. Booth remarked that anyone has any doubt about these stations doing the work, they are invited to call upon him when in Portland and a copy will be given them permitting them to visit the Portland station in Columbia street which has been in successful operation and handling commercial business for some time.

# ECHO PLANS IRRIGATION

Pendleton, Feb. 26.—Wild and un-  
founded rumors have been abroad in this city of the organization of a new irrigation company for the purpose of bringing water from the Dardennes river near Noll, to the land east of Echo. Echo visitors in the city say the residents of the town are enthusiastic over the scheme as it is a big one and will add greatly to the wealth of the country immediately surrounding it.  
When the new scheme has been completed a vast area now under cultivation, and being used for the production of wheat and other dry farming products, will be irrigated. Fruit and garden lands are now supported as many more heavily as at present.  
Complete surveys of the matter have been made and preliminary work will soon be under way. They are the promoters of the scheme, and business is not doubted by those who have observed the work being done.  
Just who is at the head of the new company is not known at present, but it is thought the Spokane and Portland capital is at the back of the new enterprise.

Several of the March magazines have devoted numerous pages to the Africa that Mr. Roosevelt will see. Whether for his information or for advance notices of his to-be-written book upon the animals of the Dark Continent, is not quite clear.

The American is one of our foremost magazines. The issue for March is, in our opinion, the best fiction number issued by any publisher of magazines in the United States. That is a very good deal. One of the best stories in the magazine is the department written by William Allen White. It is entitled "The Old Order Changeth" and is a discussion of the changes in our political, social and economic life, written, and displaying a grasp of the subject not to be surpassed by any other American journalist.
