COLONIST SEASON OPENS TOMORROW, GOOD OUTLOOK

Next week brings colonists. Anticipating such a rush as has never been equalled in development history of the northwest, the Harriman lines are preparing for judicious handling of the increased business. Usually, when colonist travel is heavy, westbound trains run on hard schedules and are often many hours late. But this spring, according to advices from head offices, special effort will be made to handle the traffic on regular schedule. Especially that portion of the traffic which comes through the Huntington gateway and must go over the Blue mountains through La Grande, will be well taken care of. Sufficient power is on hand in the local round house to care for the business that will commence to expand in freight departments as well as passenger circles.

BANQUET BRINGS FORTH WIT AND GOOD THINGS TO EAT

Nothing more delightful from every point of view has been attempted in a social way by the Methodist Brotherhood of this city, than the first annual banquet which was given in the Foley hotel last evening to members of the Brotherhood and dozens of guests, totalling in all more than 100. From the hour that the banqueters were seated until the last toast was spoken—simultaneously with the striking of the midnight hour—frivolity, good cheer and interesting speeches were the order of the hour. The banquet itself was a revelation to many and the Ladies Aid society has since been showered with praise for the toothsome of the courses and the dispatch with which the large assemblage was served. It was the consensus of opinion that a more generally perfect banquet has been tendered anybody or anyone in this city. When hunger was spent, the guests settled down for a series of speeches that for wit, instructiveness and general interest was hard to duplicate. President F. H. Green outlined in a few well spoken words, the purpose of the Brotherhood, paying a poetical tribute as well, to George E. Goode, in whose house the banquet was held. In introducing Toastmaster J. D. Gillilan, he turned loose a stream of witticisms that ran rampant for several hours. With one exception, the prearranged program was carried out in toto. Mayor Hall was unable to attend, but extemporaneously, Walter M. Pierce filled the vacancy. He did it well, too, and storms of applause greeted the conclusion of his address.

Rev. C. E. Deal, pastor of the local church, was the first to toast. To him was given the first topic under the general theme, "Our Badge." He handled the subject well. Rev. Hadley, secretary of the Idaho conference and general organizer of the club, followed, pointing out the great need of men to carry on every grade of work. Judge J. W. Knowles spoke along the line of work being done in the state. He rehearsed recent political developments in Oregon in a manner that won for him hearty applause. The younger element of the Brotherhood took an active part, too, for W. W. Ferguson and W. W. H. Clark handled their subjects with as much interest as any of their elders. Marble Green and O. M. Heacock lent wit to the occasion with a splendid violin duet. H. C. Vinacke, Hon. Walter M. Pierce and H. J. Hockenberry rounded the toast program. Mr. Hockenberry's word-picture of the difference between the 19th and 20th century Methodism was one of the feature toasts of the evening. Singing the Brotherhood song to the tune of "America," the banquet came to a close and similar affairs in the future will have to search for originality to keep up with the pace set by this, the first of its kind. 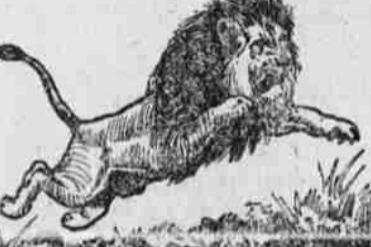
