## CRITICAL STAGE HERE

### RICHARDSON DELIVERS A HEART-TO-HEART TALK.

Need of Unity and That Present Crisis Must Be Met Well Might Be Called Summary of Richardson Speech—Representative Audience Listens Intently to "Tom."

Men, women and children last night listened to a heart-to-heart plea for a greater La Grande, through the instrumentalities of public-minded and public-spirited men, women and children. The crowd was representative of the varied walks of life in La Grande. The desert of that feast of boost-diffusing speeches came at the last of the list, but local lights of prominence in their respective lines and vocations, paved the way for the principal speaker of the evening.

Tom Richardson was never more earnest, nor more eloquently impressive. In his straight from the shoulder manner he pleaded with his audience to "do." "La Grande today is at a critical stage in its development," he explained. "The city must do now, today, or be set back with such a jolt that recuperation will be both hard and slow. If she would form an unbreakable crust of stagnation that will impede future progress, then let the irrigation scheme go by; let the park movement drop; forget that paving and sewer proposition. Forget to advertise."

Unity is strength and minds of one bent was a sub-theme generously elaborated on. "Whatever may be the personal difference has no weight when it comes to fulfilling a great municipal undertaking," the speaker ejaculated. "United we stand, alone we fall, might paraphrase his assertions.

His plea had its effect. Men of the business directory went home feeling ashamed that more had not been accomplished in the past and that in the future more would be undertaken and more put on the records of realities. His lecture was a warm-up proposition. It served its purpose well. It fanned dying embers of municipal thrift and it drove to white heat that illustrious spirit of public men who are today at the helm of the Commercial club doing worlds of good that from day to day are now evinced on the face of them.

On the stand were several members of the Commercial club. Turner Oliver gave a hasty resume of what the club has done; T. H. Crawford commented on the magnitude of the irrigation schemes; C. E. Cochran pleaded with the audience for greater support for the Commercial club in the way of actual work. Then came Mr. Richardson.

Then agitate, speak, work in this spirit and fuller realization of labor's aims will follow. And, remember, that your best friend and ally, if your cause is just, is the church. Come into the church. She has a welcome for you. She has a message for you. She has the best help for you. As you take Christ, the Savior and Lord into your life, into your counsel, into your movement, will your life be blest and happy and your aims most surely accomplished.
