railroads and in industrial enterprises
carrying on interstate commerce. The
steps which my predecessor took and
the legislation passed on his recom-
mendation have accomplished much,
have caused a general halt in the vi-
cious policies which created popular
alarm, and have brought about, in the
business affected, a much higher re-
gard for existing law.

To render the reforms lasting, how-
ever, and to secure at the same time
freedom from alarm on the part of
those pursuing proper and progressive
business methods, further legislative
and executive action are needed. Re-
lief of the railroads from certain re-
strictions of the anti-trust law have
been urged by my predecessor and will
be urged by me. On the other hand,
the administration is pledged to legis-
lation looking to a proper federal su-
pervision and restriction to prevent
excessive issue of bonds and stocks
by companies owning and operating
interstate commerce railroads.

Then, too, a reorganization of the
department of justice, of the bureau
of corporations in the department of
Commerce and Labor, and of the In-
terstate Commerce commission, look-
ing to effective co-operation of these
agencies, is needed to secure a more
rapid and certain enforcement of the
laws affecting interstate railroads and
industrial combinations.

His Tariff Stand.

A matter of most pressing impor-
tance is the revision of the tariff. In
accordance with the promises of the
platform upon which I was elected, I
shall call congress into extra session,
to meet on the 15th day of March, in
order that consideration may be at
once given to a bill revising the Ding-
ley act. This should secure an ade-
quate revenue and adjust the duties in
such a manner as to afford to labor
and to all industries in this country,
whether of the farm, mine or factory,
protection by tariff equal to the dif-
ference between the cost of production
abroad and the cost of production here
and have a provision which shall put
into force, upon executive determina-
tion of certain facts, a higher or max-
imum tariff against those countries
whose trade policy toward us equita-
bly requires such discrimination. It
is thought that there has been such a
change in conditions since the enact-
ment of the Dingley act, drafted on a
similarly protective principle, that the
measure of the tariff above stated will
permit the reduction of rates in cer-
tain schedules and will require the ad-
vancement of few, if any.

As to Asiatics.

The admission of Asiatic immigrants
who cannot be assimilated with our
population, has been made the subject
either of prohibitory clauses in our
treaties and statutes, or of strict ad-
ministrative regulation secured by di-
plomatic negotiation. I sincerely
hope that we may continue to min-
imize the evils likely to arise from such
immigration without unnecessary fric-
tion and by mutual concessions be-
tween self-respecting governments.
Meantime, we must take every pre-
caution to prevent, or, failing that,
to punish outbreak of race feeling among
our people against foreigners of what-
ever nationality who have by our grant
a treaty right to pursue lawful busi-
ness here and to be protected against
lawless assault or injury.

Elasticity in Currency.

One of the reforms to be carried out
during the incoming administration is
a change of our monetary and bank-
ing laws, so as to secure greater elas-
ticity in the forms of currency avail-
able for trade, and to prevent the
limitations of the law from operating
to increase the embarrassments of a
financial panic. The monetary com-
mission lately appointed is giving full
consideration to existing conditions
and to all proposed remedies, and will
doubtless suggest one that will meet
the requirements of business and of
public interest. We may hope that
the report will embody neither the
narrow view of those who believe that
the sole purpose of the new system
should be to secure a large return on
banking capital, or of those who
would have greater expansion of cur-
rency with little regard to provisions
for its immediate redemption or ul-
timate security. There is no subject
of economic discussion so intricate and
so likely to evoke differing views and
dogmatic statements as this one. The
commission in studying the general
influence of currency on business and
of business on currency, have wisely
extended their investigations in Euro-
pean banking and monetary methods.
The information that they have de-
rived from such experts as they have

found abroad will undoubtedly be
found helpful in the solution of the
difficult problem they have in hand.

The incoming congress should
promptly fulfill the promise of the re-
publican platform and pass a proper
Postal Savings bank bill. It will not
be unwise or excessive paternalism.
The promise to repay by the govern-
ment will furnish an inducement to
savings deposits which private enter-
prise cannot supply, and at such a low
rate of interest as not to withdraw
custom from existing banks. It will
substantially increase the funds avail-
able for investment as capital in use-
ful enterprises. It will furnish the ab-
solute security which makes the pro-
posed scheme of government guaranty
of deposits so alluring without its per-
nicious results.

Conservation of Resources.

The putting into force of laws which
shall secure the conservation of our re-
sources, so far as they may be within
the jurisdiction of the federal govern-
ment, including the most important
work of saving and restoring our for-
ests, and the great improvement of wa-
terways, are all proper government
functions which must involve large ex-
penditure if properly performed. While
some of them, like the reclama-
tion of arid lands, are made to pay
for themselves, others are of such an
indirect benefit that this cannot be
expected of them. A permanent im-
provement like the Panama canal,
should be treated as a distinct enter-
prise, and should be paid for by the
proceeds of bonds, the issue of which
will distribute its cost between the
present and future generations in ac-
cordance with the benefits derived. It
may well be submitted to the serious
consideration of congress whether the
deepening and control of the channel
of a great river system, like that of
the Ohio or of the Mississippi, when
definite and practical plans for the en-
terprise have been approved and de-
termined upon, should not be provid-
ed for in the same way.

Change Electoral Vote.

I look forward with hope to in-
creasing the already good feeling be-
tween the south and the other sections
of the country. My chief purpose is
not to effect a change in the electoral
vote of the southern states. That is a
secondary consideration. What I look
forward to is an increase in the tol-
erance of political views of all kinds
and their advocacy throughout the
south, and the existence of a respect-
able political opposition in every state;
even more than this, to an increased
feeling on the part of all the people
in the south that this government is
their government, and that its offi-
cers in their states are their officers.

Personally I have not the slightest
race prejudice or feeling, and recog-
nition of its existence only awakens
in my heart a deeper sympathy for
those who have to bear it or suffer
from it, and I question the wisdom of
a policy which is likely to increase it.
Meantime, if nothing is done to pre-
vent, a better feeling between the ne-
groes and the whites in the south will
continue to grow, and more and more
of the white people will come to real-
ize that the future of the south is to
be much benefited by the industrial
and intellectual progress of the negro.
The exercise of political franchises by
those of his race who are intelligent
and well-to-do will be acquiesced in,
and the right to vote will be withheld
only from the ignorant and irrespon-
sible of both races.

James Schoolcraft Sherman is not
given to long addresses at any time,
and his inaugural speech was no ex-
ception. When sworn into office by
retiring Vice-President Charles W.
Fairbanks, he said:

Senators: There is no need to re-
cite the history of this great legisla-
tive body, proud of it though we be;
nor yet to suggest methods which
might in coming time enhance its use-
fulness. The world knows the one
and you understand the other.

In a government for and by the peo-
ple the necessity of clearly defining
the rights and limitations of the sev-
eral branches thereof is manifest. An
hundred years has demonstrated the
far-sightedness and wisdom of the
framers of that instrument which has
furnished the foundation of our leg-
islative action. The vice-president is
not one of the makers of the law. His
duties are rather to regulate in this
body the method of making them; to
regulate not in accord with his will
and ideas but in accord with rules
which you yourselves have established.
It is for the presiding officer to re-
quire you to act in conformity with
your self imposed regulations just as
it is the duty of the supreme court to
determine if your action is in accord
with the constitution. Two decades
