County and Racing Element to Combine in Purchase of County Fair Grounds for Dual Purposes—Would Be Suitable for First Proposition and Satisfactory for the Second—Expenditure Would Be Within Easy Reach.

Dr. A. P. Charlton is the originator of an idea that is meeting with the approval of nearly every one who considers it and that is for the citizens who are interested in maintaining a first-class horse and auto racing track, athletic grounds and a county fair to co-operate with the county and buy the property of the present County Fair association to be jointly used for the purposes above outline, and also for a county poor farm. Mr. Charlton's idea is for the citizens to pay one-half what the property is worth and the county the other half, but the title to the property to be vested entirely in the name of the county.

This tract of land is too valuable for the county to purchase for poor farm purposes, but there being ample ground—69 acres all the very best of land—this combination would prove mutually advantageous to all, and the county would not only have a first-class poor farm, but also first-class ground for its annual fairs, race meets and sports in general, and provide a training track for breeders of young stock. Dr. Charlton says that he has not investigated, but has been informed that the property can be secured for about \$10,000. If the county could get this for \$5000 it surely would be a good buy, and if the people generally could secure the use of the same for the purposes suggested

by Dr. Charlton, it would be equally as good a bargain.

MISS LYNE TOURS SPAIN

DAUGHTER OF MR. AND MRS. PAUL WRITES FROM PARIS.

Prima Donna Well Known in La Grande Will Sing in America Before Going to England—Interesting Letter From Mrs. Hill at Paris.

"The Lincoln centenary was celebrated in Paris at the Lyceum club two weeks ago," writes Mrs. Hill, daughter of Captain and Mrs. A. M. Paul of this city, from Paris. She is associated with the journalistic section of the club.

"Mrs. Mason, wife of the United States consul general, is president of the American section and received the guests, numbering over 250, among the distinguished people like Ambassador and Mrs. White, Dr. Henry Van Dyke, the last named giving an address on the life and services of the martyred president. Mr. Henry Eames, whose exquisite music represented the three races, red white and black, and it was typically American. Mrs. Eames rendered the following program:

From an Indian Lodge, MacDowell. Omaha Indian song, transcribed by Henry Eames.

"Uncle Remus," (a mood picture of the typical negro), MacDowell.

"Some Times I feel Like a Motherless Child," a negro (slave) song of the south, transcribed by Coleridge, Taylor (an negro) Englishman.

Etude de Concert in F Major, MacDowell, by Mrs. Hill.

Another item of interest to La Grande received by Mr. and Mrs. Paul is one which says:

"A tea was given by Mrs. Hill at the Lyceum club of Paris in honor of Miss Felecia Lyne, a niece of Mrs. F. E. Moore of La Grande, previous to her departure for Spain, where Miss Lyne is engaged for a concert tour. Miss Lyne has received flattering offers from Coven Garden, Royal opera, of London, but as an acceptance of same would be binding for several years, Miss Lyne will most likely be heard in America before she appears in England.

"Mr. Henry Eames, also a western American man, but now numbered among the great artists in the world's art center, delighted the invited guests at the tea with numbers from Chopin, Schubert and Schumann."

LOCAL SOLONS WILL ATTEND

State Senator Turner Oliver and State Representative Stephen F. Richardson will be in Salem on March 15, when the special session of the Oregon legislature will convene to rectify mistakes and errors that crept into legislation believed to have been effectually carried out when the regular session was held. It is reported that the senators and representatives were exacted promises not to introduce other bills than the ones needing attention.
