### LOCAL ENDORSEMENT FOR

#### HAMPTON IS LIBERAL.

School Board Members Showered With Telegrams From Pendleton Urging Selection of A. C. Hampton—Young Man Is Graduate of University of Oregon.

Principal A. C. Hampton of the Pendleton high school, is in La Grande seeking to further his candidacy for selection as city school superintendent to succeed H. J. Hockenberry, next year. Since his stay here Mr. Hampton has been calling on members of the board and backed by a strong local endorsement in making an impression. In addition to the local backing his Pendleton friends have showered the members of the school board with telegrams. There are a large number seeking the same office and few others have been on the ground to make personal effort.

Mr. Hampton is a young man who now holds a responsible position with the Pendleton schools. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon.

# ELECTION IS OVER

### HALL, RAYBURN AND SHEAK ARE ALL WINNERS.

Defeat of Williamson is Surprise to Most—Vote Not a Heavy One, Yet Spirited Contest in a Few Offices Result—New Officials Take Seats on Monday.

No election passes without its surprises and yesterday had its share, though only in one instance was the real unexpected resultant. Much as supposed, M. K. Hall was elected to succeed himself. Councilmen Andrews, Monroe and Meyers were re-elected, but J. T. Williamson met defeat. Even this defeat was not entirely unexpected to those who have kept abreast of the fight in the Fourth ward of late.

While Mr. Williamson has said nothing to the effect, it is rumored that liberal trades were made for vote that all counted against the re-election of the chairman of the water committee, John Sheak in his successor.

#### Rayburn Wins Fight.

The peaceable fight conducted for the marshalship was won by Lou Rayburn, ex-city marshal, his majority being 41. The race was close and undecided until the heavy majority from the Fourth ward was added in to offset the lead that Walden had in the Second ward.

#### Socialist Vote Heavy.

The man to pole the heaviest socialist vote was G. D. Simmons, opponent to D. E. Cox, for city recorder. Close to him was Heidenreich, who registered 181. This is pleasing to the socialists of the city who have seldom been credited with that strength in La Grande.

#### Into Office Monday Night.

The new officials go into office next Monday night, when there will be two council meetings—the last of the old and the first of the new. Doplists have figured it how the re-elected councilmen will draw two salaries on that occasion.

#### A POSSIBLE VACANCY.

#### Judge Knowles' Party May Not Return Without Venison.

This morning a wagon load of deer hunters left early for the headwaters on Beaver creek, in search of deer. The party consists of Judge Knowles, Court Reporter H. R. Hanna, Dr. G. L. Judge Knowles replied as to how long they would be absent from the city, and stated that no one would return until a deer was slain, and the officials about the court house are rather undecided whether it would be in order to drape the judge's desk in mourning or not, thinking perhaps he might never return.
