INTERESTING TRACK WORK.

Large Squad Out in Training for Inter-scholastic Meets.

Deep interest centers in the athletic circles of the high school student body. Between a dozen and a score of candidates for places on the track and field team report regularly for practice and during the last few nights especially, have shown rapid progress. The field and weight events have been neglected, while the entire squad lay special stress on fast starting, sprinting and light endurance running. The squad is fast and the sprinters that represent La Grande in the coming track meets will of necessity have to be able to run the 100 considerably under 11 seconds and the 220 proportionately fast. The hurdles are receiving some attention and at least one will start in the tryouts for fast race with about equal chances of winning.

At this stage it is expected to predict what will result in track and field events, but the track team will be a worthy adversary for any school team when the hour of the first meets comes around.

End of the Day Grind.
New York, March 12.—The six-day grind at Madison Square Garden ends tonight with a crowd of 10,000. The show has been well attended. The foreign spectators took a lively interest in the contest, and showed the foreign competitors in every way possible.

Atlanta, Ga., March 13.—The Cincinnati Reds have made an early start. They are playing today the third game of a series of nine in this city, the other dates being March 11, 12, 13, 18, 19, 20, 25, 26, 27. On the 24th they play the Georgia University club at Athens.

Annapolis, Md., March 13.—The Navy, Princeton and Pennsylvania meet tonight in fencing. This is the only meet of the teams that has any bearing on the intercollegiate standing of the teams.

Players to Report April 5.
April 5 is the time set for the candidates for the La Grande baseball club to report in La Grande. If the present indications can be taken as a criterion, the fan leaders of the section where the Inland Empire league is to be organized, will meet at Baker City in the near future to perfect the league. Once such steps are taken Grant Lincoln will marshal his timber in quickly and commence early work-outs.

Bird Shoot at Elgin.
What promises to be one of the most interesting events to take place in shooting circles will occur St. Patrick's day, March 17, at which time the shooters of northern Union county will hold a blue rock shoot for an oyster supper, says the Elgin Recorder. Only shooters from the northern end of the county will be admitted, and it will be strictly a local affair. Two captains will be selected and the shooters will be divided into two squads, the losing side being required to buy the oyster supper for the winners. It will be a 25-bird event, and the first 10 birds will be shot at from a 15-yard line, or, in other words, the shooting will commence at the 15-yard line and as each man hits a bird he will be required to step back an additional yard until the 20-yard line is reached, which will be the limit. Those who

miss the first 10 birds will be privileged to remain at the 15-yard line. Then the remaining 15 birds of the event will be shot at from the position occupied by the shooter at the close of the shooting of the first 10 birds.

This system has been adopted to give each man an equal chance which, together with the fact that each squad will be made as nearly equal as possible, will give all shooters a fair show. Local shooters are arranging and boosting the event and it is hoped to have every shooter of blue rocks in this end of the county present. It is expected to make it one of the best of the season, and enjoyable for all who participate.

A practice shoot will be held Sunday afternoon, to which all are urged to be present.
