## GROCERY STORES NOT UNDER "LID'S" BAN.

### Mayor Law of Union, Explains Recently Adopted Lid Ordinance—Asks for Correction of Wrong Impressions.

Union, Ore., March 19.—(To the Editor, La Grande Observer.)—I notice in your issue of March 17, some statements regarding the "lid on at Union," which are not true and wish you to correct the same. The lid, as you call it, prohibits the sale of intoxicating or malt liquors of any kind, prohibits persons under 21 from entering or patronizing any cigar and tobacco store, or pool and billiard parlor, and makes no reference to grocery stores in this prohibitive section. It closes everything on Sunday except as noted by you, but does not prohibit ball games. All the councilmen were elected on the reform ticket as well as myself and were expected to make these reforms, and I am glad to say that two-thirds of the council stand pat on passing these ordinances and will do the same when it comes to enforcing the same.
