PUNISH BLIND PIGS.

Special Effort Will Be Extended In Umatilla County to Clean House.

That the temperance people of the county are to get busy in an effort to eradicate the blind pigs from Pendleton and the other towns of the county is the announcement being promulgated by the officers of the local law enforcement league. To further this purpose a mass meeting has been called to be held in this city next Sunday afternoon, according to a Pendleton paper.

Pendleton has been made the headquarters for an anti-saloon league, the jurisdiction of which will cover all of eastern Oregon as far south as Harney county. Rev. E. F. Zimmerman of Portland, has been placed in charge of this field and the meeting Sunday will be under his direction.

This will be the first gun to be fired in a series and which will mark the beginning of a campaign of activity. It is hoped to so stir up public opinion as to make it impossible for the blind pigs to continue in business. All those interested in law enforcement, without respect to religion or creed, are invited to attend the meeting Sunday.

"Shorty" Has Adventure.

"Shorty" Logue went to Hot Lake yesterday to shoot carp in the waters of the pond there.—Star Item.

It is evident that the Star reporter missed a part of the recital of Shorty's adventures at Hot Lake. It is a matter of common knowledge that carp in great numbers, some of them of enormous size, are to be found in the sloughs in the vicinity of Hot Lake and Union; but as yet no one has had the experience that befell Mr. Logue on his trip yesterday. To tell the truth in as few words as possible, a monster carp, with teeth as long as a short rake handle, and a tail with which a man's leg could be easily broken, resented the hunter's attempts to pierce his hide with "22" bullets, and finding his enemy entirely surrounded by water, viciously attacked him. Mr. Logue avers that he had to climb the nearest telegraph pole, and must needs perch himself 10 feet above the surface of the water in order to be out of reach of the angered animal. BANK MAY REOPEN.

Prairie City Institution Seems Not Hopelessly Involved.
Baker City, March 22.—Information received from Prairie City today states that the Stockmen & Traders' bank, which failed to open for business Sat-

urday, is likely to make the suspension only temporary and reopen its doors within the next month.

Attorney Poland has gone to Portland and Salem to consult with financial heads of the state, and also the state bank department. He stated before leaving Prairie City that there was no doubt in his mind but what everything could be adjusted satisfactorily and the institution soon be in shape to again resume business.

According to the best knowledge of the failure obtainable today the bank loaned its funds in such a manner as not to provide for the cash account. In other words, the time loans were not graduated so that they would fall due at proper periods to keep sufficient cash on hand to take care of the business.

The loans are said to be mostly to good ranchers, who have the necessary collateral to make the bank safe.

The failure as described at present resolves itself into a case of incompetent bank management according to people who have kept reasonably close watch on the Prairie City institution.
