Cashier of Sugar Factory and Prominent Citizen Takes Departure for New Location Early Next Week—Will Go Into Retail Lumber Business There.

After four and a half years with the Amalgamated Sugar company as cashier of the La Grande factory, H. A. Monson has resigned, his resignation regretfully accepted, and he leaves with his family for Cache Valley, Utah, next Monday. Mr. Monson leaves office work for a retail lumber business in Cache Valley, where his brothers are now located, and are anxious to have Mr. Monson join them. In accepting the resignation tendered the head office Secretary Henry Rolapp pays Mr. Monson a well-earned compliment.

If the family can manage to sell their household goods before next Monday they will depart on that day for their new home. The L. D. S. church loses one of its leading members, musical organizations will suffer by his departure and in many ways, in fact, will the family's departure be felt in this city.

LAST APPLE SHIPMENTS.

Ends Season That at First Seemed Dull But Finished Strong.

La Grande's last shipment of 1938 apples left the city last night over the O. R. & N. and the Ramsey-Oldenberg warehouse is empty. This winds up a year of apple business that early in the season gave evidence of being financial loss, but as the shipping progressed, profits kept growing and before the new year came, the market was not in a bad condition at all.

Leaves Walla Walla for More Favored Location Near Imbler.

Edwin Morrison of Walla Walla, passed through La Grande this morning en route to his new home at Rinehart Spur, where he purchased 240 acres from Henry Rinehart recently. His household goods were also shipped today and later his family will come. Mr. Morrison is a young man imbued with the great possibilities of this valley and has left a good country to come to a better one.

BAD CHECK ARTISTS.

Baker City Merchants Victimized by Clever Forgeries.

Seven Baker merchants were victimized Saturday evening by one of the cleverest bad check artists that has worked in this vicinity for a long time. In each place the man made small purchases, giving in exchange a \$15 check and taking the balance in change, relates the Democrat. The victims include Dillsheimer, Foreman & Co., H. V. Halvorson, J. T. Baldweg & Son, W. A. Baird, Mrs. J. L. Licklider, Mrs. E. L. Sullivan, the Stockman's saloon.

In each instance the check operator offered a check purporting to be drawn by Fred Entermille, a farmer living north of the city, for \$15, the man representing that he had been in Mr. Entermille's employ. The checks were all endorsed by John S. Brown. The man's purchases ran as high as \$5 in each place, the latter being the

amount paid for a ladies' hat which he bought.

The officials believe that the man had a confederate. Early last week two men visited Mr. Entermille and tried by various ruses to obtain his signature. In this they were unsuccessful, but after leaving his home they traced his telephone line, so that when Brown began his check work Saturday night it was impossible to reach Entermille by telephone to discover whether or not the paper was genuine because the confederate had cut the telephone wire.

Sheriff Rand, after having been notified, wired immediately a description of the man and learned from Deputy Sheriff Hannon at Huntington that a fellow answering his description had been seen at that place Sunday. As yet the offender has not been located.

SANDRIDGE BUYS STOCK

George L. Cleaver, who spent yesterday in the vicinity of Allice and Imbler in the interest of the irrigation proposition, met with greater success than he had hoped. Besides adding several thousand dollars to the stock subscription list, he talked to many farmers who will use water and who would subscribe stock were they financially able to do so at the present time. The farmers, without exception, are very much in favor of the project, and evince much interest in the progress of the work. The promoters of the project, which term includes every progressive man in the section to be covered by the water, are very anxious to see a great part of the stock subscribed by the land owners, thereby giving to the users of the water a voice in the management of the corporation, both in regard to regulating the price and determining where ditches, laterals, etc., are to be run.

The list tonight will represent subscriptions in excess of \$60,000. Ray W. Logan and J. L. Caviness are out in the valley today securing additional subscriptions.
