MINES WRECKED LATE BANK PRAIRIE CITY INSTITUTION USED POOR JUDGMENT. Stockholders Owe Bank Large Sums—Bad Mining Stock Helps Ruin the Bank—Receiver is Appointed.

Baker City, March 24.—Developments regarding the failure of the Stockmen & Traders bank at Prairie City show that the bank has accepted mining securities for loans and at the time of failure two mining companies owed the institution heavily. There are also indications that stockholders of the bank were permitted to borrow funds from the institution, and it is intimated that one director owes the bank in the neighborhood of \$7000. The climax of the institution's career came through a suit filed against it by the Merchant's National Bank of Portland. That bank was correspondent of the Prairie City institution. Since the panic of 1907 when Portland banks were battling their eyes and several of them failed to stem the tide, things have been going hard with the Stockmen & Traders' bank at Prairie City. Confidence seemed to lessen in it and enemies of interested men. It is alleged, took occasion to organize runs on the little bank.

Taxes Cut Some Figure. Peculiar as it may seem there is a possibility that payment of Grant county taxes had something to do with the bank's closing. The tax collector deposits public funds in a bank at Canyon City. Lately the time has been on for paying taxes and property owners around Prairie City gave checks in payment. These checks took money out of the Stockmen & Traders' bank and the tax collector deposited it in a Canyon City bank. With the weakened condition existing from other points of attack and failure to realize on mining loans, augmented by directors and stockholders of the bank being unable to meet their paper, the whole thing became a hopeless wreck and the doors closed in all probability never to open, regardless of the optimistic report that was sent out from Prairie City a few days ago.

Receiver is Appointed. J. R. Poland arrived in Baker City this morning on his way home from Portland, where he had been on business connected with the failed bank. He was appointed by the court as receiver and will wind up the bank's business as speedily as possible.

Will Pay Out. To a reporter for the Baker Herald Mr. Poland said as he boarded a Sumpter Valley train this morning: "As receiver of the bank I am not at liberty to make statements of any kind, nor to give out any explanations other than the bank, in my judgment, will pay dollar for dollar to all depositors and stockholders. There was but \$7000 call deposits and \$3000 on time certificates when the bank closed. The liabilities are in the neighborhood of \$30,000, while assets range far above that including all paper, some of which may be slow to realize upon. The bank was solvent but various things combined against it and there was nothing to do but close up shop."
