UNEARTH SKELETON.

Sluicing Crew Finds Skeleton Near Baker City and Attempt to Solve the Mystery.

Who lies buried upon the eastern slope of the hills now being washed down to make the dam for the Baker Irrigation company's Sunnyslope reservoir? asks a Baker City paper.

On Monday, the stream of water from the hydraulic giant, which is being used to sluice down the hillside, unearthed a human thigh bone, and the workmen are now watching anxiously to find further portions of the skeleton of some man whom they believe to have been buried there in an early day.

The thigh bone was of the left leg, and from its size the man whose sole relic it now is, must have been six feet in height. It was uncovered at a depth of from six to eight feet from the surface of the hill, and was in an excellent state of preservation. It is not thought that the body was buried so deeply, but that the erosion of the hills and the tramping of many bands of cattle and sheep across the hills had served to cover the body so deep-

ly. A close watch is being kept and the men expect within a few days to unearth other parts of the skeleton.

It is believed the remains must be those of some old prospector who wandered off in that district in an early day and died, or of some emigrant who missed the old emigrant road, leading out by the Virtue mine, some five miles from where the bone was found, and was buried on the hillside.

CURREY BUGGY BROKEN UP.

Family Scared by Automobile and Strikes Delivery Wagon.

Fred B. Currey's family carriage was considerably smashed up in an accident on Depot street this morning. "Spot," the family charger, was serenely swinging down the street in his characteristic trot with Rev. C. E. Deal at the rear end of the reins. A noisy automobile started Spot sideways too quickly to permit intervention and the driver of the Polack delivery wagon was unable to make gangway. When the melee had eased up a bit, the Currey chariot was minus a wheel and some other accessories, but the animal and driver escaped unharmed.

Circus Strikes New York.

New York, March 25.—A new circus came to town today, and is showing in Madison Square Garden. This is the biggest circus in the world, and is the combination of Ringling with Barnum & Bailey, which every spring for 25 years has appeared at the Garden. The Ringling show is the only show that has been able to compete with the Barnum & Bailey. In 26 years it has risen from little or nothing to the highest honors in the circus world. It now owns the Barnum & Bailey circus, which has to open its season this year in Chicago. Before James A. Bailey died, the circus feud had been dissipated, and he became associated with Ringling Bros. in business. They divided the country for the two big shows and never conflicted. The Ringling Bros. claim that in their two shows there are more wild animal varieties than in all the zoological gardens of the country.

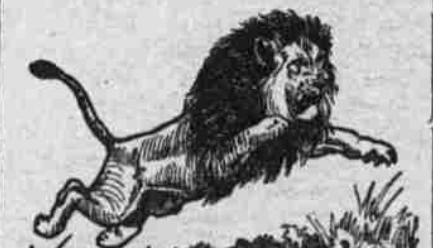
To William Dye, Defendant above named, Greeting:
