ONTARIO READY FOR CONGRESS.

Many Distinguished Men Expected at Development Meeting.

Ontario, March 25.—At a special meeting of the Ontario Commercial club last evening plans were perfected for the meeting of the Oregon-Idaho Development congress, which will meet in this city next Friday and Saturday. The various committees made favorable reports and the present indications are that this will be the largest attended session of the Development congress yet held.

The Commercial clubs of Boise, Weiser, Caldwell, Vale, Burns and Nyssa are arranging to send large delegations while representatives will be present from all of the important centers of the two states. Among the prominent personages who will be present and address the congress are Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton, president of the congress; Col. E. Hofer, of the Salem Journal, vice-president; Col. C. E. S. Wood of Portland, Governor Brady of Idaho, Hon. Fred J. Kiesel of Ogden, Senator Hart of Baker City, Hon. A. W. Gowan of Burns, Judge J. H. Richards of Boise, and Hon. Sam White of Baker City.

The reception committee will open headquarters in the Commercial club rooms and the Ontario Encore band will meet all trains Friday and escort the delegates to the club rooms, where accommodations will be assigned to the visitors. Both the Masonic and Odd Fellows' hall will be used as reception rooms for the guests during the congress.

The committee on accommodations is doing all it can to insure the comfort of the visitors while in the city.

HAVE FLOAT AT PORTLAND

The board of managers of the Commercial club decided at a meeting last night to provide for a float at the Portland Rose festival, to be held June 7 to 12. The float will be emblematical of the chief and characteristic resources of Union county—sugar, lumber, cherries, apples, etc.

Union county will also be fittingly advertised at the A. Y. P. exposition.

A committee, of which J. D. McKennon is chairman, was appointed to take charge of the soliciting campaign for the irrigation project, and from this time on until the work of organization is complete and actual construction has begun, the club's energies will be mainly expended in boosting for this, the biggest thing La Grande and the valley has ever undertaken.

BAN ON BAD FRUIT LOTS

OFFICIALS WILL CONFISCATE ALL AFFECTED LOTS FOUND.

Dealers in Apples Must Beware Lest They Deal in Affected Apples at This Time of Year—Stringent Laws Govern—Fruit Conditions Excellent.

La Grande merchants need to look to their apple stock as the time of the year when the growers are apt to unload affected apples, has arrived. District Commissioner Judd Geer is over from Cove today and affirms that close scrutiny will be maintained on all dealers handling apples, and any time that affected fruit is found in their possession as salable goods it will be confiscated. The state law has no jurisdiction on size, but moth and scales are not tolerated in the markets. This enforcement of the law will be carried on in all cities where Mr. Geer's jurisdiction extends.

Speaking of fruit conditions in Cove Mr. Geer affirms that indications could not be better than right now.
