ELECTION
TOMORROW

The school election, for the purpose of voting yes or no on the question of bonds to provide for a new high school building, will begin at 4 o'clock tomorrow, and will be held in the high school building. Any resident taxpayer, according to attorneys, has the right to vote.

The officers of election will be chosen tomorrow afternoon at the polls. It is evident, judging from the deep interest taken, that the vote will be large. Several have been heard to affirm today that they would exert all possible strength to defeat the new building while again there are many who earnestly believe that a matter of high taxes has but little bearing on the welfare of the schools. There seems to be some misunderstanding as to what other solutions can be made of the demands for more room. The matter is so weighty that the voter needs be careful to acquaint himself with all facts attained at first hand, before casting his vote one way or the other.

TRAIN HITS
A SPEEDER

Clarence Moulton, son of Street Superintendent G. B. Moulton of Baker City, was struck and seriously injured last evening by train No. 2 at a point about 10 miles east of Pendleton. Although the young man's condition was stated last evening to be critical at St. Anthony's hospital at Pendleton, whether he was taken, it was declared the injuries were not fatal.

The accident occurred upon a sharp curve along the Umatilla river, which the O. R. & N. parallels at that point. No. 2 was running about an hour and a half late and was running up the steep grade at as fast a speed as could be made when she rounded a turn and came suddenly upon a speeder carrying three men, one of whom was the unfortunate Moulton. The speeder was not 100 yards distant from the train when the danger was first perceived.

Moulton's comrades on the speeder

were his chief, Engineer Leach of the right of way department of the road, and Axeman Smith, whose headquarters are at Pendleton. Mr. Moulton was the roddman of the party, and the men had been spending the day in going over the roadbed along Meacham creek.

As soon as the men on the speeder perceived their danger the engineer and axeman jumped and escaped without injury. Moulton, however, had been seated between the other members of the party and before he was able to jump the speeder collided with the train.

The unfortunate boy was thrown several feet into the air and to one side of the track. The force of the

collision was such that "by being thrown against the locomotive he was seriously injured about the spin.
