BASEBALL IN WALLOWA

Shall Wallowa have a baseball team this summer? asks the Wallowa News. This question is beginning to trouble the lovers and devotees of the national game considerably. There are numbers of good players in Wallowa and the Wallowa team has been the champion team of the valley every year that an efficient organization has been maintained. But this year the team faces the proposition of no place to play. A year ago the baseball association failed to pay dividends and the persons holding stock became dissatisfied. The stock eventually fell into the hands of a few and the ground was divided up and placed on the market. Since then the same ground has been used, but the fence and grandstand have been removed, and it is difficult to collect gate money. Besides this, several owners of lots in the old grounds have expressed their intention to build. It is now proposed to raise money to buy and improve a suitable ground; and to avoid the possibility of one man and the ground being sold, it is suggested that the title of the ground be in the name of the city, but so stipulated that the city cannot dispose of it and that it shall always be a baseball park. One thousand dollars will buy a good ground. The matter should receive the careful consideration of every progressive citizen as well as the admirers of athletic contests.

BOOK REVIEW.

The April issue of the Sunset will be a "San Francisco, Three Years After" number, and will consist of 22 pages of elaborate engravings illustrating text, which will deal chiefly with the city's restoration—a marvelous record of rebuilding since the fire 1906. The magazine contains much interesting reading for the general reader, together with illustrations such as only the Pacific coast could make possible.

Among the popular writers who will contribute to the April number of *Almslee's Magazine* are Joseph C. Lincoln, Mary H. Vorse and Elizabeth Duer. Harold McGrath's new serial begun in the current number is a big fiction feature that should reap good returns for the news dealer, for Harold McGrath is a novelist of widespread popularity. The magazine has been enlarged by 16 pages.

The leading feature of the April number of the *American Magazine* will be a paper by Jesse Lynch Williams about Mr. Cleveland and the stories he used to tell among his intimate friends. The next instalment of Mr. Baker's series, "The Spiritualist," will appear in the May number—the April number containing a more definite announcement in regard to it. Ida Tarbell will write on "Tariff by Barter and Jugglery." W. S. Thomas will have a stirring paper on "Older and Newer Ideals of Marriages."
