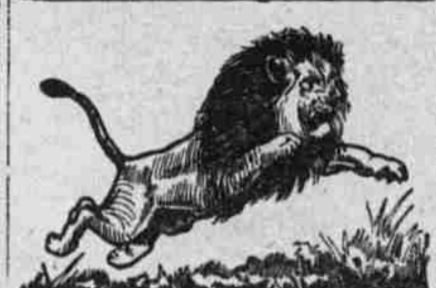
To William Dye, Defendant above named, Greeting:
