SECURING EARLY EXPRESSIONS.

The Oregon Teachers' Monthly is endeavoring to secure an expression from the teachers and county school superintendents of the state as to their choice for state superintendent. It is understood that J. H. Ackerman will not be a candidate for reelection. The county school superintendents have been first requested to name their choice and these will be considered as nominations. The names of those nominated by the superintendents will then be published in the Monthly and the teachers of the entire state requested to vote upon them. The name of the voters are not to be given out.

It is announced that so far those in the lead for nominations are L. D. Alderman, formerly county school superintendent of Yamhill county and now instructor in the state university; President P. L. Campbell of the state university; J. A. Churchill of Baker City schools; President E. D. Reasler of the Monmouth normal; R. F. Robinson, county superintendent of Multnomah county, and E. E. Bragg, county superintendent of Union county.

BILL OF LADING EFFECTIVE.

The new Southern standard bill of lading will go into effect today, and the shipping interests of that section are much pleased as a result. To aid the shipper in understanding the new system, the Transportation Committee of the Louisville Board of Trade has issued a letter, in which the system is fully explained. There is little difference between the new bill of lading for this section and the one used north of the Ohio river, but

concessions have been made Southern shippers such as they have not secured before.

NEW MEDICINE LAW.

According to the act passed at the last session of the Canadian Assembly, respecting the sale of patent medicines, which goes into effect today any preparation which contains chloral, aconite, ergot, strychnine or any other of the numerous list of deadly drugs, will have to be approved by experts of the department of inland revenue or bear a printed statement on the outside of each package that there is a deadly drug in the preparation and the name of the drug.

Every new automobile means an additional booster for good roads. An owner remarked yesterday that if the Booth lane had been in good condition this year that there had been few days but what the auto could have been in service all winter. The Booth lane is the gateway to a large section of the Sandridge, where the roads are nearly always in good condition. It would be difficult to even estimate from a dollar and cents standpoint the loss to the farmers of the Sandridge and the business interests of La Grande that could be charged up to the Booth Lane road, a little figuring will prove the assertion, that the loss would exceed the amount to require a sufficient number of dollars to cover the surface its entire distance and the excess would then macadam it.

Within the next few days orders for new automobiles will begin to arrive. One dealer stated yesterday that there would be no less than twenty five new machines in the county this year and this number may be exceeded by fifty per cent.
