ALBERTA LAND BUYERS MAKE GOOD PROFITS

A large number of Union and Umatilla county farmers and investors who bought Canadian Pacific wheat lands in the Calgary, Alberta district last fall have enjoyed a handsome profit as all the land in the western section of the 3,000,000 acre tract east of Calgary has recently advanced \$5 per acre.

The central section has just been placed on the market where immense quantities of good wheat land can now be bought on the main line of the Canadian Pacific and on the Canadian Northern at \$10 per acre on 10 year's time.

Jonathan Johnston the Canadian Pacific colonization agent will leave Pendleton on April 5 with a large party to look at this new land. A rate of but \$15.25 from Pendleton to Calgary has just been made by the Canadian Pacific.
