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THE CONVERSION TABLE.

In view of the interest in irrigation in this valley at the present time we think well to print a conversion table, prepared by Mr. E. H. Hedden, project engineer of the reclamation service. Mr. Hedden is just now engaged in Idaho, in connection with the Deer Flat reservoir.

One miners inch equal 1-50 cubic foot per second.

Fifty miners inches equal 1 cubic foot per second.

One miners inch continuous flow for 24 hours equal .64 acre feet.

One cubic foot per second for 24 hours equals 2 acre feet (approximate).

One miners inch per acre for 26 days equals 1.2 acre-feet per acre.

One miners inch per acre for 47 days equals 1.8 acre-feet per acre.

One miners inch per acre for 60 days equals 2.4 acre-feet per acre.

One miners inch per acre for 75 days equals 3 acre-feet per acre.

One miners inch per acre for 96 days equals 3.6 acre-feet per acre.

One miners inch per acre for 105 days equals 4.2 acre-feet per acre.

One miners inch per acre for 120 days equals 4.8 acre-feet per acre.

One acre-foot is enough water to cover one acre foot deep or is the equivalent of 172 inches of rain.
