RECEIVER'S OFFICE OPEN

BAKER MEN DEFENDING THEIR CLAIMS TODAY. Eberhard's First Task is to Listen to Arguments and Testimony in Now Closely-Watched Case—Government Attempts to Set Final Proof Aside.

After standing idle for fully one month, the receiver's office of the local land office is now open, and commencing Monday, moneys will be received as regularly done. Colon R. Eberhard the new occupant took the oath of office early this morning and immediately assumed control.

His First Duties. The first task falling to his lot was to hear arguments in a case brought by the government against a rich mining concern of Baker county known as the Ancora Gold Mining and Milling company. Backed by testimony from government experts of all description, the interior department is attempting to set aside final proof as made alleging that the land is of the timber and stone kind. The suit is similar to the ones now pending in Southern Oregon. The government has a large host of experts here today and the defense is likewise protected by a long string of witnesses.

Under the direction of the water superintendent all the fire hydrants in the city are being given two coats of red paint. The painting served the double purpose of preventing rust and making the hydrants the more easily located in time of need. It was intended to paint them either white or yellow, but the proper kind of paint in these colors could not be obtained.
