The others are Tom Williamson, Ed Hughes, Lot Snodgrass, Ernest Gust, Vic Melville, Leo Hearing and "Doc" Bacon. Tom Williamson is rodman, Melville and Bacon chainmen, Snodgrass and Gust axemen and Hearing will be rear flagman. The first camp will be made near Morgan Lake tonight.

The line from the reservoir to the vicinity of the camp will probably be completed this afternoon. The next camp will be pitched on Rock Creek and the third one at Dividing Corral. From thereon the camps have not been selected, but will be chosen as

the convenience of the workers dictates.
