WAREHOUSE CHARGES REDUCED.

Farmers' Organization Have Forced Trust to Reduce Charges.

The announcement is made that warehouse charges are to be reduced from 75 to 50 cents per ton on grain handled by all of the trust warehouses doing business in the Inland Empire, says the Farmers Pacific Union. This notice is being heralded throughout the land, the trusts taking pains to have it advertised in the press of the Northwest.

There is a method in this action. No one can doubt that this reduction forestalls the building of warehouses by the Farmers' Union and kindred associations, two of which exist in Union county. The price is being placed back at the old figure which prevailed for 20 years until the grain combine had perfected such a strong organization that the managers thought they had the situation "clinch-ed" and could control prices to suit themselves. There is little doubt that had they been unmolested another advance would have been made this year, instead of a reduction being ordered. It is not boasting, but simply repeating the truth to say that had it not been for the farmers organizing and building a few grain warehouses and the fear that they would continue and eventually handle all of their own grain which has forced the combine to drop prices. This means that the farmers have forced a reduction in warehouse charges which will save half a million dollars annually to the farmers of the Inland Empire. That is several times the cost of conducting the Union for a year.

The difference in the methods pursued in lowering the rates from that used when rates were raised is astonishing and amusing. The combine arranged to raise warehouse charges months before the crop was harvested and had all printed receipts and other matters arranged beforehand, yet no announcement was made. No

one knew until the first load of wheat was delivered at the warehouse and the receipt taken that charges had been advanced. It was a blow in the dark and came at a time when there was no way to avoid it. Harvest was on and the grain had to be delivered to the warehouses.

Said election will be held and conducted and the returns thereof filed as provided by law in the case of general city elections in said city.

The polls at said election will be opened at the hour of 9 o'clock A. M. and closed at the hour of 5 o'clock P. M. on said election day.

The ballot title of the act aforesaid will be prepared by the city attorney and filed with the city recorder of said city, in the manner and time required by the laws of the State of Oregon governing the initiative and referendum in cities and as in the Ordinance aforesaid provided.

All qualified electors of said city will be permitted to vote at said election.
