Since entering school at Pullman last February, Jay's eligibility to participate in intercollegiate contests has been questioned on the grounds that he has not the required number of credits to qualify for the team under the conference rules adopted in 1907.

REAL ESTATE MOVING.

Wallowa County Paper Has Big Collection of Transfers.

The Enterprise News Record reports the following real estate transfers, that are of interest in La Grande:

The Grande River bottom farm, known as the George Post place of 160 acres just below Powatka, has been sold by the Enterprise Real Estate company for Georges Hedges to E. A. McKenna for \$2950. Hedges, who resides at Turlock, Cal., traded with Post for the place a few months ago. Mr. McKenna is a Walla Walla capitalist. He visited the farm the post, and other North Country points, in company with Judge Corkins.

The land is a fine fruit ranch. Mr. McKenna intends fixing it up, and making it an ideal peach orchard.

The Enterprise Real Estate company sold a lot in Birchland addition for Michel Stubbfield to Mac Wood of La Grande; consideration \$135.

Sam Litch concluded the deal Saturday for the Dick Martin ranch

down Swanamp creek, 14 miles from Enterprise. He pays \$2400 for the 160 acres. The ranch has a fine, never failing spring and as Mr. Litch already owned 100 adjoining it gives him a fine 320 acre stock ranch.

The Turlock Tribune tells of the sale of the Moline ranch of 77½ acres, 3½ miles southwest of Turlock by W. J. Funk to D. M. Johnson of Oakland for \$20,100. Mr. Funk bought the place a little over a year ago for \$11,500, according to the Journal, but his relatives in Enterprise understand it cost him but \$10,00, including considerable personal property. He made quite a lot of improvements on it, but on the other hand he cleared a good sum off it the past season.

The Journal says Mr. Funk is soon to move his family to Oakland where his son expects to engage in the study of dentistry.

This doubling his money in one year proves what this paper said when Mr. Funk went to Turlock, that he would "teach the natives how to farm."

C. H. Zurcher brings the word from Hood River that Wm. and Albert Reavis have recently made good sales of part of their property. William sold 10 acres for \$15,00 and Albert sold 10 acres for \$10,000 and Albert got the same sum for 7½ acres. He paid \$4500 for the place a year ago.
