ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY VOICES AT WALLA WALLA

Whitman college authorities are desirous of having a large number of parents and friends as well as other visitors, in Walla Walla during the tri-state track meet on Thursday and Friday, May 6th and 7th. Not only will there be in Walla Walla at that time the two days of the track meet, the declamation contest on Thursday evening, but there is also the May Music Festival extending from Friday evening through Saturday evening, two concerts by the Chicago Symphony orchestra, a chorus of one hundred and fifty voices, and soloists including some of the most noted singers of the United States. In the Music Festival there will also be a matinee on Saturday afternoon. Rates are offered on all of the railroads coming into Walla Walla. The rate is one and one-third fare for the round trip. The city is beautiful at this time of the year and a large number of people from the whole Inland Empire will undoubtedly make this occasion an opportunity to visit the garden city. A committee from the Walla Commercial club has been appointed to make arrangements for all of those who desire to be entertained at that time so that no one need fear that he will be without accommodations at a reasonable rate should he desire to attend the meet and festival.

U. OF O. TEAM CLOSSES SEASON WINS SEVEN OUT OF TEN

Word comes from Eugene that the university ball team of this year is the best Oregon ever turned out. It made an enviable record on its north-western tour, losing only three games out of 10. The trip was an exceptionally hard one on the players, as three games were played in 36 hours in the Willamette valley on the beginning of the trip and seven games were played in six days in the Inland Empire. The team traveled 1200 miles. On the entire trip cold and rain were experienced, and in the raw winds the Oregon pitchers seemed hardly able to warm up having to rely on control rather than their accustomed curves. During the games at Idaho the thermometer registered but 44 degrees and the wind blew so that several times the game had to be delayed until the dust cleared. Coach Kelly was very well pleased with the team, and says by the time the championships are played off at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition Oregon will beat all comers. Every man on the team hit over 200. Gabrielson, Clark, Jamison and Coleman, hitting above the 250 mark. The following men made the trip: Gabrielson, Hurd, Henkle, Van Marter, Nelson, Jamison, Clark, Coleman, McKenzie, Sullivan, Word, McKinley, Manager Bean, Coach Kelly and Dr. Leonard. As Oregon is putting much more money and attention into baseball this year than previously, the showing of the Oregon team is especially gratifying to the students and the local fans.

RETAIL GROCERS PLAN CONVENTION PROGRAMME

Officials of the Portland Retail Grocers' Association have practically decided upon the programme for the annual convention of the National Grocers' Association which takes place here June 2-5. Arrangements are in the hands of Secretary Charles B. Merrick, of the local organization, and he has settled on most of the plans except to secure a banquet hall with sufficient capacity to accommodate the delegates for the big spread which will close the formal programme the night of Saturday, June 5. It is likely that 350 to 400 delegates will be here for the gathering, and about the only dining hall big enough for such a crowd is in the Commercial club. This will probably be secured. The programme opens Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, and three business sessions will be held the opening day, followed by a smoker at the Arion hall at 3 p. m. The delegates will take a trip up the river the next day, and in the evening Secretary Merrick will entertain editors of trade papers in attendance. Friday and Saturday will be given over to a well arranged mixture of business and pleasure. Merrick is advising all delegations which are coming to make their plans so they can stay over until the next week for the Rose Festival, and a good many of them have prepared their itineraries accordingly. The delegates will have a chance to take in two days of the festival programme before going to Seattle to attend the National Grocers' Day at the fair.—Portland Telegram.
