FIRE DELAYS THE CARNIVAL

While the Parker Shows was running from Walla Walla to Pendleton yesterday and had reached a point near Athena, flames were discovered shooting up from one of the animal wagons. The watchman who made the alarming discovery, was unable to attract the attention of the train crew and the speed of the train merely served to fan the flames, and for a time it looked as if the entire train of twenty-seven double length cars would go up in flames. Once the train was stopped, however, the fire department maintained with the snows did valuable service. Fire extinguishers were speedily brought in to requisition, and after a heroic fight on the part of every one connected with the shows, the flames were brought under control, not, however, until property valued at several thousand dollars had been destroyed.

SALE OF DISCARDED RIFLES A MENACE.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The war department is investigating the extent to which the sale of discarded firearms by concerns dealing in war relics and firearms is being carried on in large lots at auction.

The government has been informed that revolutionists in Central America, South America and other foreign countries have obtained old rifles used in the Spanish-American war, which have been the cause of no end of trouble.

The rifles discarded by European governments are also often obtained and sold in large quantities.

Chicago police are complaining, too, that guns are sold indiscriminately for little or nothing, and if such practice is continued the community might be imperiled in time of strikes or riots. Negroes in the South have grabbed at these bargains, and rifles in perfect condition have sold for \$1.75. For 50 cents cartridges and bayonets were obtained.

OLD INDIAN CAVE DISCOVERED.

A large Indian cave has been discovered in the solid rock about two miles from town. No one knows anything about this cave, not even some of the oldest inhabitants of the Goodnoe Hills, who have resided in the Columbia valley for more than 40 years. Nor do the oldest Rock Creek Indians know anything about the cave.

W. P. Rauch volunteered to lead the first exploring party of 20 Cliff's citizens to the wonderful cave a few days ago, and since that time everybody wants to see it. The cave is a mile from the railroad track. The opening of the cave is reached by a roundabout walk up a gradual ascent of from one to two miles. The doorway of the cave is between two and three feet high, and about four feet wide, an don account of the loose boulders lying near a footman, might pass very near it without observing that it was a cave. These loose rocks show by their color that they have not been moved for ages, and the quantity of them indicates that they were placed there so as to wall up the mouth of the cave if desired. The entire party went inside, and it was estimated that there was room for 200 more people.
