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MAY GET 320 ACRE HOME-

STEAD IN THIS DISTRICT

List of Lands Open to Entry Under Extended Homestead Law Includes 13 1-2 Townships in Morrow And Umatilla Counties-Land is Supposed to be Non Irrigable-List of Townships Given.

Notice has been received by Register Bramwell, of the local land office, giving a list of the lands in this district which are open to ontry under the 320 acre homestead law. There are all told 131-2 townships, three of which lie in Morrow county, east of Heppner, and the rest in Umatilla. Beginning with township 3 S., 27 E. which lies just east of Heppner and six miles south, the list includes the land north to the boundary of the Herm'ston project, and on up to the Columbia river, east almost to Freewater, and south to the north boundary of the Umatilla reservation, then southwest back to the vicinity of Heppner. A small portion open to such entry is included in the reservation. but this land of course must be taken subject to the regulations of the Indian affairs department. The description is not accurate, but describes roughly the lands open to entry under the 320 acre law. Below we give the

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7 .- Katherine Felton, of the Associated Charities of this city, today advertised in the newspapers for a baby carriage for nine months old Dolores Grijalva, the thirty-fifth child of Juan Manuelo. DRAYMAN STRUCK BY

TRAIN THIS MORNING

Seemingly Careless Driver Tries to Cross Track-is Fatally Injured-Team Killed Outright-No Blams Attached to Men in Charge of Engine-Impossible to See Team in Time to Prevent Accident.

As No. I peared Raker fitte this morning half an hour late, running at a good speed with Engineer Lou Given and Fireman Fred Shields on the engine, the train struck a team being driven by Lee H. Wallace, a drayman, and both horses were killed outright.

Wallace was thrown against the sidewalk and his head was crushed. He was at once removed to the hospital and made as comfortable as possible, but he has very little chance to live. Those who saw the accident attach no blame to the enginemen, for neither Engineer Given, who was on the opposite side of the engine, nor Fireman Shields wre able to see the team until less than 100 yards away from the crossing where the accident happened. All engineer's blow the whistle at that point, once for the crossing, and as the train nears the crossing, once for the station. Mr. Given had just released the whistle lever when the nglue struck the team.

Mr. Wallace, who is about 30 years of age, and has a wife and a little girl, had the reputation, according to reports from Baker City, of being a careless driver. The track is straight for more than a mile beyond the point of the accident, and the only explanation of the accident is that he tried to cross in front of the train, which according to Fireman Shields, was a physical impossibility. The engine was very close, as was said above, when Wallace drove onto the track.

Persons acquainted with the location said in a telephone message to the Observer this morning would have been impossible for the enginemen to have seen the team until within less than a block
