BALTIMORE, Md., May 7.—The Prohibition State Convention for the State of Maryland is now in session at Heptasoph's Hall, at which a full state ticket will be nominated before it closes. Tonight a large mass meeting will be held in Heptasoph's Hall.

SCALP BOUNTY LAW IS INTENDED TO PREVENT FRAUDS AGAINST STATE

County Clerk Wright has received from the secretary of state the scalp bounty law. For coyotes killed in this county a bounty of \$1.50 will be paid; for gray or black wolf, \$5.00; for gray or black wolf pup, \$2.50; for bob cat, wild cat or lynx, \$2.00; for mountain lion, panther or cougar, \$10.00.

TO COLLECT BOUNTY.

To collect this bounty the hunter must appear in person before the county clerk and make affidavit that the animals were killed by himself within the preceding six months; that they were killed within the county, and that they were not whelped in captivity nor brought in from any other state or county. The affidavit must also state that the animals were not killed prior to February 1, 1939. Further than that, there must be a second affidavit, from a resident taxpayer of the county, who must state that he is personally acquainted with the party who seeks payment, and believes his statements to be true.

The entire hide including the scalp of coyotes and wolves, and all four feet of wild cats, mountain lions, etc., must be brought to the clerk, who, after careful examination may sever the scalps or the front feet, as the case may be, carefully preserving them, and return hides to the owner.

This evidence that the clerk has paid for so many dead varmints must be presented with his vouchers at the next meeting of the county court, and after the account is found to be correct, the number of vouchers and the amounts paid out tallying with the provisions of the law, the scalps and feet will be burned.

State Pays Half.

The clerk must then file a statement with the secretary of state showing the amount paid out by the county, and half of the outlay will be returned from the general fund of the state.

Penalties for Falsifying.

Quite severe penalties are attached to the making of false affidavits. The law provides that any one making any false statements in connection with the collection of bounties shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and punishable with a fine of not less than \$200, nor more than \$1000, or imprisonment of not less than three months nor more than one year, or both. To make it still more impossible for the state to suffer from fraud, there is a further provision that any one attempting to collect bounties on animals not killed in the county, or within the time limit of six months, or before February 1 of this year, shall be guilty of misdemeanor, and with liability to the same punishment as for perjury. Thus a piece of trickery might very easily result in a conviction on two counts, with serious penalties.

Records and Blanks Not Here.

Mr. Wright wishes it known that

no blanks or records will be sent him, according to a letter from the secretary of state, until some time after the 22d of this month, the date on which the law goes into effect. The forms will not be given to the state printer until that date, and it will require some time for the printing to be done, and more time for shipment to be made. So that it is probable that no bounties will be paid until after the first of June.
