## O. H. KING WRITES OF HIS NEW HOME, EVERETT

EVERETT, Wash., May 10.—(To the Editor)—Thinking some of your readers might care for word from us and being too busy to write many letters I impose upon the Observer. It is a fine rainy evening. It rains quite often here and the rain is quite nice. We just keep going, really, we have had a lot of bright sunny weather. Everett is a live town of about 30,000 or 35,000. It is largely supported by lumbering. There are 11 saw mills, 20 shingle mills, three sash and door factories, a smelter which is not busy just now and over 50 other industries. A recent report says the monthly payroll is \$341,361.00. We are soon to have two new roads, an interurban to Seattle and the U. P. The Great Northern is finishing a depot said to cost \$75,000. A safe manufacturing company has secured a site and will employ, I believe, about 200 men.

We have a brewery and 41 saloons with the consequent debauchery much in evidence. Everett has six large grade schools besides smaller ones. There are 83 grade teachers and about 2900 pupils. The high school has 23 teachers and 455 pupils. There are 50 in the graduating class. Joe has delivered his "oration" tho I did not hear it. He expects his "sheepskin," at the close of the year. Harold is pounding away in the eighth grade special. He takes manual training and has already brought home one piece of furniture. There are about 30 church buildings, most of them small and behind the times. The Baptists are preparing for a modern house. The Methodists, Presbyterian's and Congregationalist's have good sized buildings. I have met most of the preachers. On April 12 the Everett ministers invited the out of town preachers of the county to a luncheon. Twenty five, including several of our wives, were in attendance and judging by Mrs. K. and myself we all enjoyed ourselves.

The Y. M. C. A. has a building and some fine workers and we have a Carnegie library with about 8,000 volumes. My work is heavy, our building is old style very inconvenient, but finely located, the lots being worth about \$10,000, I presume. We began with near 150 members in all and about as badly a scattered condition

as I ever seen. We had 86 in Bible school March 7, and have reached 141 at a regular meeting, not a rally. Mrs. King has a fine Philiahea class with about 20 enrolled and I have about the same number of Baracas. The Junior C. E. has about 40 and the Y. P. C. E., about 50 enrolled. The Juniors will soon be divided into Juniors and Intermediates.

There have been 45 added to the church since March 1, including one not yet baptised. Of these, 11 are beginners in the Christian life, while others have united by letter and statement. We are raising money for missions and benevolent work and hope to accomplish much good in the work through the strength given of God.

I have been wonderfully helped by the prayers of true believers in La Grande. God only knows the real value of such helpers.

I rejoice that Brother Ellis is doing so well. So many have written us of his work. We miss the many dear friends both in and out of the Central Church of Christ, but it seems that it was the right time for us to move and Everett is surely a needy and a fruitful field for christian effort. So we are glad to be here and hard at work.
