MARYLAND STATE PROHIBITION CONVENTION

BALTIMORE, Md., May 7.—The Prohibition State Convention for the State of Maryland is now in session at Heptasoph's Hall, at which a full state ticket will be nominated before it closes. Tonight a large mass meeting will be held in Heptasoph's Hall.

PENDLETON MINISTER AND PRINTER FACE JURY CHARGE

Not alone for land fraud artists, defaulting adjutant generals and blind pigs operators is the fame that goes with a grand jury indictment, says the East Oregonian.

This was proven yesterday afternoon when word was received here of the indictment by the Wallowa county grand jury of Jack Huston, the well-known printer, and Rev. W. T. Euster, former pastor of the Methodist church of this city, but who is now pastor of the Sunnyside Methodist church of Portland.

For the alleged breach of the laws regarding the setting out of fires in forest have the two men been indicted by the Wallowa county jury. Though details are lacking it is the presumption that the reputed violation occurred last summer while the two men in question were upon a hunting jaunt in the wilds about Wallowa lake.

According to Mr. Huston he is absolutely in the dark regarding the charges against him and Mr. Euster. He says they were hunting in Wallowa county but that he recalls no

overt act which they committed. He is positive no forest fires resulted from their carelessness and is in hopes of easily proving his innocence. He phoned this forenoon to his former hunting partner and says that Mr. Euster is likewise astounded at the news of his indictment.

The hunting trip by Messrs Euster and Huston was taken last summer shortly after the close of the prohibition campaign during which Rev. Euster led the prohibition forces while Mr. Huston published the Monday Magnet in behalf of the saloon forces.

Now After Euster.

This afternoon Mr. Huston received word from Enterprise that the sheriff had gone on to Portland to secure Rev. Euster and that he is relying upon Sheriff Taylor to take care of the Pendleton man. He will pass through in train No. 6 in the morning and Mr. Huston will proceed to Enterprise with the party.

According to Mr. Huston he received some information this afternoon that convinces him that the whole difficulty has grown out of a case of mistaken identity.

MAIL LETTERS AT STATION

SHEARING TIME NEAR

The sheep shearing season in this county will open June 1, that being the date set for starting up of the plants, Martin's, Makin's and Baudan's, relates the Enterprise News-Record.

Reports from the lambing camps are of a favorable nature, and there has been a good increase, probably

better than the average year.

Owing to the great activity of the wool buyers in this state, all sales days will probably be declared off, according to Secretary Dan P. Smythe of the state wool growers association. Shaniko may have one sales day, but all others will likely be abandoned. The growers around Pendleton and Pilot Rock are getting 20 to 21 cents for their wool says the East Oregonian. It is said the new scouring mill at Echo will not handle over 125,000 pounds.

BOYS DEBATE WEDNESDAY

Promising, though youthful, champions of forensic skill will vie with each other next Wednesday evening at the Presbyterian church, when the Lambda Phi Alpha club of the Presbyterian church will meet a team from the Blue Mountain association of the M.
