How time changes issues. For years and years the press and the platform were demonstrating the difference between a "Protective Tariff" and a "Tariff for Revenue." For weeks congress has been busy with a tariff revision bill and none of these pet and former differences of the two great parties, have scarcely been mentioned. The tariff is purely a matter of local interest. Whether or not cotton is on the free list, does not interest the north, neither does the tariff on wool especially interest the south. There are many things uncommon, where all sections of the country are interested but the country has reached the point that to raise an amount sufficient to carry on the expenses of the government, the tariff schedules are sufficiently high to give ample protections to every industry. Consequently it has practically ceased to be a party issue.

The idea of a Tariff Commission is gaining ground rapidly. Thus the fear of a general tariff revision, which always disturbs business, prior to our presidential elections would be eliminated.

While the grange for many years has exerted a great deal of influence politically and socially in this state, the reports of the present condition just made show that there are more members at present enrolled in the several organizations than at any previous period in the history. The grange movement in this state dates back nearly, if not quite one half a century.

Every county in the state is in a condition of unrest over the new assessment being made. The assessment makes little difference providing the levy is not made too high and it might be well for county courts to see that taxes next year are no higher under the new assessment than under the present arrangement.
