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GIANT CANVASS TOP FOR CELEBRATION DURING 4TH

MOST EXTENSIVE PLANS FOR CELEBRATION EVER ATTEMPTED IN LA GRANDE LAID LAST NIGHT

La Grande had a splendid celebration last year, but in the enthusiasm of the committee in charge of the arrangements for the coming Fourth is criterion by which to judge, the festivities of 1920 will surpass those of other years by many degrees. The committee remained in the club rooms talking over the plans and methods until one of the members suggested that as it was almost sunrise, it might be well to adjourn.
Mac Wood was elected chairman and he at once named the chairmen of the sub committees as follows: William Ash, finance; J. H. Peare, sports; William Miller, program; W. R. Jones, parade; F. S. Bramwell, grounds and decoration.
Upon the shoulders of Walter M. Pierce will fall the task of obtaining a speaker. He hopes to be able to get one of the foremost men of the Northwest. Mr. Jones will have as one of his chief assistants, "Senator" Allison, whose band of (name 'em yourself), was one of the most prominent features of last year's parade. Mr. Allison will be given carte blanche. While it is not possible at this time to forecast more than a general plan

for the celebration, yet there are at least two special features worthy of mention now. Instead of building an expensive arbor of evergreens and immediately after the Fourth tearing it down and so practically wasting a lot of good money, the committee is negotiating for a giant canvass top, which after being used for the celebration, will be folded up and laid away for future use. It will belong to the citizens of the city, and may be used for all meetings calculated to further the public welfare, for instance the fruit fair planned for Autumn.
It will cost but little more if any more than a temporary arbor of evergreens, and will last for years. To give the canvass a holiday effect or appearance, it will be decorated with flags and streamers and the sides will be walled up with evergreens.
Another plan that is out of the ordinary is to hold a night parade in which at intervals there will be wagons carrying colored fire. Owing to the fact that the Fourth comes on a Sunday, the celebration will be held on the day following.

GRANGES TO WORK FOR HIGHER STATE EDUCATION

The state, county and subordinate granges of Oregon, including the granges in Union county, are making plans to greatly advance the cause of education this year. The work is under the supervision of J. J. Johnson, State Grange Lecturer, assisted by Sup't Ackerman, Pres. Campbell of O. A. C., Prof. Alderman of Eugene, Miss Miss Marvin of the Oregon Library Commission, Misses Ison and Cox of the Portland Library, and other prominent grangers of the state.
At the 36th annual session held at McMinnville, \$250 were appropriated to assist the library commission in distributing literature this year. They also recommended each subordinate grange to appoint a committee to visit the rural schools of their county and aid in securing more sanitary school houses and beautifying the school grounds.
In the literary work next year, such questions as "The County as a unit of Government," "Tuberculosis," "Patent Medicines," "Clean Milk," "Conservation of Water," "Good Roads," "Birds as Farmers Friends," "Higher Education," "Tax Reform," and the "Uses of Denatured Alcohol," will be

discussed.
Much interest is being taken in the cause of higher education and this with the other features of the granges help to prove the truth of the assertion made by Ex-President Roosevelt during the reception given granges in the White House last year; "That the grange is the world's broadest organization."
