WESTON GRADUATES LAST CLASS FOR TWO YEARS

WESTON, Ore., May 27.—With the assembly hall of the Normal school crowded to the doors with a throng of admiring friends and relatives, 11 graduates were last night handed the little rolls of sheepskin certifying to the fact that they had completed the prescribed course of the Eastern Oregon State Normal school. While the exercises were among the most successful ever held they were also the most pathetic. In addition to the fact that commencement is always a sad season for students, this was made doubly so by reason of the fact that it is to be the last commencement for the local institution, for two years at least.
Flowers were piled high about the front of the platform and at the conclusion of the evening's exercises scores of people pressed forward for the farewell leave-taking.
The commencement oration was delivered by Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton, who delivered an exceptionally able and eloquent address to the graduates.
Miss Lillian Holman was the class valedictorian, while Miss Claudia Kelley was the salutatorian. An oration was delivered by Benjamin W. Curry, another member of the class.
The concluding part of the evening's exercises was the presentation of the diplomas by President R. C. French to the 11 graduates, all but two of whom were from towns outside of Weston. The members of the class were: Lillian Holman, Claudia Kelley, Bessie Winn, Florence March, Doris Barnes, Ada Ely, Louene Hoisington, Benjamin W. Curr, Pina Mayfield, May Meighen and Benjamin F. Brown.

EXPECT DECISION IN LOCAL OPTION CASE ON TUESDAY

Local attorneys expect a decision from the supreme court in the case of Julius Roesch against Union county wherein the local option law is attacked and declared invalid, due to negligence on the part of Sheriff Childers in improperly posting notices of a local option election at the time the June election was held last year. Those who have followed the decisions coming from Salem, say that in the regular order of events, a decision will be handed down on this case next Tuesday. The supreme court almost always follows the docket down in logical order and if such is continued, the Roesch case will be reached next Tuesday. Knowing this, friends and foes of local option will hold their breath until the work is spoken that will make Union county wet, or leave it dry as now.

THOUGHT HE OWNED LAND THAT BELONGED TO U. S.

L. D. Loudermilk of Tilden, Nebraska, has done an act, which at the best, surprised W. J. Townley of Union. It appears Loudermilk has found in the records of the local land office, a vacant 80 acre tract of land near Hot Lake. He immediately filed homestead application on the tract, and when further investigation was made, it was learned that the 80 had been under plow and hoe for years. Townley, the orchardist of Union, owns land surrounding the little piece of very desirable land, and through some error in deed or otherwise, Mr. Townley came honestly by the claim that the land was his. At any rate he tilled it like the adjoining land, but will of course, retract and leave the homesteader to his rights.
