## Ordinance No. 425, Series 1909.

An ordinance to provide for, and to determine the number, size and location of places of entrance and exit to and from all opera houses, theatres, public halls, churches, lodgerooms, clubrooms, school houses, office buildings used for public gatherings, and hotels, lodging and boarding houses; the manner of hanging doors thereat, and regulate the width of halls and stairways and aisles in all buildings used for public gatherings.

## THE CITY OF LA GRANDE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1—That all opera houses, theatres, churches, school houses, public halls, lodge rooms, club rooms, and all other buildings used for public gatherings, all office buildings, hotels, boarding and lodging houses, shall have at least one front on a public street, and shall have in front suitable means of entrance and exit. All outside doors in such buildings shall be not less than four feet wide, and shall open outward; all doors at the head of stairways shall be of the same width as the stairways, and shall open outward. Exits shall be provided in such buildings, on the second floor and on all floors higher up, leading to stairs, ladders or other suitable means which shall at all times be kept in good repair, and in condition to furnish a safe descent to the ground for the inmates of such buildings. Over each of such exits there shall be on the inside the word "Exit" painted in large letters not less than six inches high; in no case shall there be less than two such exits to each of such buildings, and in case any such building is of sufficient capacity to accommodate 100 persons or more, there shall be in such buildings at least three such exits which shall be indicated by the word "Exit" painted over the same on the inside as above provided.

Section 2—In all theatres, opera houses, public halls or other buildings used for public gatherings, all seats in the audience rooms, except seats in boxes, shall be firmly fastened to the floor, and no seat therein shall have more than six between it and an aisle; all main aisles and passage ways shall be at least three feet wide, and no chair, stool or other obstruction shall be placed in such aisle or passage way, or in any hall or passage way leading from the auditorium to the outside of the building; every door communicating between the aisles and passage ways in the auditorium and any lobby or corridor, shall have a clear opening of not less than the full width of the aisles and passage ways leading to such doorway, and each door shall open outwards.

Section 3—Every portion of the building devoted to the use of the public, and all outlets leading to the street shall be well and properly lighted during every performance, or while the building is open to the public and shall be kept so lighted until the audience has left the building; during every performance, or while any such building is open to the public, all doors thereto shall be left unlocked and unfastened. All stage lights, except electric lights, shall have strong metal guards or screens of sufficient fineness so that any material coming in contact therewith shall not be in danger of the flames and all exits in such buildings shall be marked as provided in Section 1 of this ordinance.

Section 4—All stairways in opera houses, theatres, halls or other buildings used for public gatherings, or in hotels, boarding or lodging houses, lodge rooms or club rooms serving for the exit of 100 persons or more, if straight stairs, shall be not less than four feet wide and of winding or curved stairs, then not less than six feet wide; in no case shall the risers be more than 7½ inches high, and the steps not less than 11 inches wide, and if the stairs are winding or curved, then the point or narrowest part of the step shall be not less than 7 inches wide. Provided, however, that when, after this ordinance goes into effect, any building of the kind and character mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance, shall be built, or any such building already built, shall be rebuilt or remodeled, then the width of all doors and stairs shall be increased at least 11-2 feet beyond the width of doors and stairs as required by Section 1 and 4 of this ordinance.

Section 5—Any person the owner of, or lessee, agent or manager of any opera house, theatre, public hall or other house for public gatherings, who shall fail, refuse or neglect to comply with the provisions of any ordinance or who shall violate any of the provisions thereof after thirty days from date of the passage of this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof before the Recorder be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00 or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than 5 days nor more than 100 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Recorder.

Section 6—Inasmuch as there are no regulations governing the matter of providing for the protection of the people in public buildings, and it is necessary to immediately provide for protection from fire, and to secure the safety, peace and health of the city, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and take effect on and after the 5th day of June, 1909, after its approval by the Mayor, and its publication for one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer.

Passed the Council on the 19th day of May, 1909, by seven members voting therefor. Approved this 20th day of May, 1909.
