## BIG SPLURGE ADVERTISED

F. B. Currey, the publicity man of the Commercial club, and J. C. Gardner, an engineer, were callers here Monday, says the Wallowa Sun.

They were on their way to Joseph to make arrangements for an outing to be given by the engineers of La Grande to Wallowa Lake on Sunday, June 20. A rate of one fare for the round trip will be made from all points on this branch for the occasion.

Mr. Currey informed us that his town is going to outdo everything that ever happened in the way of a Fourth of July celebration. Not only is the eagle to scream over our national birthday but it will celebrate at the same time the first dirthrowing for the Meadowbrook project. When completed this will place 30,000 acres under cultivation. The reservoir will cover 740 acres and the average depth will be 54 feet.

As to the celebration on the Fourth those gentlemen say that their town is going to combine about a dozen celebrations of the ordinary sort into one grand glorious, never to be forgotten "high jinks." Mr. Currey will personally superintend the tying of the boquet to the eagle's tail while Mr. Gardner will have charge of the lion's cage where people from this valley will have an opportunity to emulate what our forefathers did one hundred and thirty years ago plucking the mane from the lion, provided they make it up into brushes to paint the town in the evening. There will be a cheap excursion rate, of course.
