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MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE COMING UP BEFORE CITY COUNCIL THIS EVENING

Several matters of importance will come up before the council meeting tonight, although the members of that body are hoping that the session will not be as long as those of the last few months have generally been. There will be introduced a resolution limiting the number of near beer joints in the city, probably to six. No one now having a license will be compelled to surrender it, except for cause, but as fast as the licenses now in force expire, the council will refuse to reissue them until the number is cut down to the limit considered desirable.

City Auditor.
For some months there has been talk among the councilmen and the other city officials in regard to employing a city auditor, whose duty it would be to audit the accounts and reports of all officials every month

and make a detailed report of the same. The cost of having this work would be very small and the satisfaction of knowing the exact financial condition of the city at the end of every month, to say nothing of the other advantages of such a proceeding, would far more than offset the expense of hiring a competent man.

New Councilman.
Very likely the voters of the Fourth ward will present their petition, asking for the election of Jeff Bullto the council, to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of G. M. Curtis, who resigned to go to Telocaset, where he is stationed in the helper services. No other candidate for the place is known of at this time, and if a sufficient number of voters have signed the Bull petition he will probably be elected.

OVERLAND TRAIN TURNS SECOND CLASS PASSENGERS AWAY THIS MORNING

A score of people were turned away from the 9:35 train this morning because they were not inclined to buy pullman tickets. The overland train No. 7, carries one second class coach and the others are pullman or observation cars. Just about 30 had purchased tickets for points west, where the train is scheduled to stop, but learned when the train arrived, that standing room was at a premium and seats could not be had at any consideration, except in the pullmans. Some few bought the pullman tickets, but most of them deferred their journey until the local came along to night.

The train is a splendidly equipped affair for first class passengers, but it seems the company is not anxious to carry passengers of the coach order. Naturally there was considerable ado at the station at the refusal of the crew to let ladies aboard the train unless possessing pullman tickets. In a measure, the company can be excused for this condition of affairs, but the local agents should be notified in advance as to the condition of the coach carried on the train, and tickets refused at the ticket office when the coach is filled before it reaches La Grande.

BUILD CEMENT WALK.
J. K. Wright Will Improve Property by Addition of Walks.
One hundred and eighty lenial feet of cement walk will be constructed by J. K. Wright, corner Sixth and P streets. Surveyors are now establishing the grades. The walk will be 120 feet long on one side, and 60 on the other. When finished the walk will be an improvement to the street and a liberal addition to the total amount of cement walks in residence districts. There will also be 120 lenial feet of inside walks.
