The railroad boys are busy as bees arranging for their coming excursion. They are doing everything in their power to make it as pleasant as possible for all who take advantage of spending the day along the beautiful Wallowa river, and at Wallowa lake.

Congress is still drilling away on the tariff. The indications are however that it will come to a final vote within the next few weeks. It will be so warm in Washington that in order to get away the minority will give in. Night sessions in July means increased laundry bills for the solons.

City Recorder Cox is having copies of the proposed charter delivered to the voters of the city as required by law. This gives every voter an opportunity to read and carefully consider what he is voting for. However, this same charter has been before the people twice before and the general provisions are well understood. It has been gone over and over and in its present state is meeting with practically no opposition whatever.

The entire Northwest is pleased with the attendance at the Alaska-Yukon exposition by eastern people. The trains are all loaded, and the great majority are either going one route and returning over different routes which gives them an opportunity of realizing what a great country lies west of the Rocky mountains.

Independence day is coming. Just at present La Grande is engaged in preparation for the biggest, best, most truly patriotic celebration in the history of the city. When we say patriotic, we speak advisedly, for if the people of a town are all pulling together, working in harmony, dropping thought of individual gain for the common good, such a state of affairs means patriotism, and patriotism of the same quality that we have for the national government. This spirit of zeal for the good of the city at large is commendable, it is the saving grace. When other towns of Eastern Oregon, not in this valley, thank you, are having difficulty in raising a small celebration fund, and are struggling along, with neighbors fighting each other in a business way, one hauling this way and another pulling that, according to the personal prejudices of each, with never a thought of any but gain for self, La Grande has been forging to the front, in business as in every other line, until now the commercial travelers, barometers of business, will tell you that it better here than in any other town between Boise and Portland. Down at Portland the other day the spirit of the city was typically illustrated by the float emblematic of our resources, in which rode the daughter of our chief of police. The city of La Grande received more notice from the visiting throngs and the people of Portland than did any other city of its class in the state. More than one observer was heard to say that ours was the best float, with one exception, in the parade. The exception was the float sent by the city of Seattle. After the Fourth is come and gone, well do something else.
