SPECIAL ELECTION NOTICE.
Tuesday, June 22, 1909.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that on 22 day of June, A. D. 1909, a special election will be held in the city of La Grande, in the County of Union and State of Oregon, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters thereof, the proposition of adopting or rejecting an act entitled:

"An act to provide a revised and consolidated charter of the City of La Grande, in the County of Union, in the State of Oregon," filed in the office of the City Recorder of said City on the 21st day of April, A. D. 1909, and ordained by the city council of said city by Ordinance No. 418 Series 1909, entitled:

"An ordinance ordaining a revised and consolidated charter of the City of La Grande, Oregon, and submitting the same to the legal voters of said city for adoption or rejection at a special election to be held therein on June 22, A. D. 1909," duly passed by the council of said city at a regular meeting thereof on the 21st day of April, A. D. 1909.

The polling places designated for said election and the judges and clerks appointed to conduct said elections are as follows:

FIRST WARD—polling place at Court House.

THIRD WARD—polling place at Ramsey Building on Pennsylvania avenue.

FOURTH WARD—polling place at Harris Hall.

Judges—Bernard Logsdan, Wm. Thompson, G. E. Fowler. Clerk—J. M. Kochensparger, J. T. Williamson.

Said election will be held and conducted and the returns thereof filed as provided by law in the case of general city election in said city.

The polls at said election will be opened at the hour of 9 o'clock A. M.

and closed at the hour of 5 o'clock P. M. on said election day.

The ballot title of the act aforesaid will be prepared by the city attorney and filed with the city recorder of said city, in the manner and time required by the laws of the State of Oregon governing the initiative and referendum in cities and as in the Ordinance aforesaid provided.

All qualified electors of said city will be permitted to vote at said election.
