WEHRUM, Penn., June 23.—One man known to be dead, and twelve badly burned as a result of an explosion of a mine of the Lackawanna Coal and Coke Company today. It is thought that the death list will be small.

Fire broke out this afternoon in the mine. It is feared that 65 entombed men cannot be rescued alive. A telephone message from the mine says that three are known to be dead, and six fatally burned, and 25 seriously injured.
