King Edward's "official birthday" will be celebrated in London and at all home stations tomorrow, elaborate ceremonies in which the army and navy will participate will mark the occasion. The king's real birthday is November 9, and this date will be celebrated at all other stations. Holding the "official" celebration in June adds gaiety to the London season and is of great assistance to the shopkeepers, who need the money. The king's kindly compliance in permitting his birthday to be set forward several months is the subject of much favorable comment among those financially affected and is pointed out as only another illustration of his good nature and regard for the welfare of his subjects.

The governorship contest at this time is between J. W. Bailey, Superintendent of Schools, Aekerman, George Cameron, district attorney in Multnomah county, Dr. Withycombe, Grant E. Dimick, county judge of Clackamas county, Charles A. Johns of Baker City, and possibly Dr. Andrew G. Smith of Portland, according to S. A. Lowell of Pendleton. The uncertainty of the present situation is the purpose political of Governor Benson. Many think that he will seek the honors; others that he desires to be re-elected secretary of state. His action will probably depend upon the condition of his health when the primaries draw near.

The first railroad train ever equipped with wireless telegraphy apparatus passing through the state was brought to Portland during the past week by the California Promotion Committee, carrying an excursion of 100 prominent business men of California. The visitors were entertained by the Commercial club with a ride about the city and dinner at the club. Speeches were made by the Californians and the friendly sentiments expressed were responded to by Portland business men. The visit of the excursionists resulted in creating a closer common interest between the two sections of the Pacific coast.

With a special band concert, vocal selections by some of the best talent in the city, and speeches by distinguished citizens the new Carnegie library, erected at a cost of \$25,000, which amount was donated by Mr. Carnegie, was thrown open to the general public Tuesday evening.

"Let 'em kiss their heads off. Give them room," was the gist of an order handed down to the police of Pittsburg by Superintendent Thomas A. McQuaid, when asked for a decision on "spooning" in the big public parks of Pittsburg.

There is a collection of United States notes, greenbacks, silver certificates, gold certificates and other species of the national currency in denominations of from one dollar to ten thousand dollars.
