PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that on 22 day of June, A. D. 1909, a special election will be held in the city of La Grande, in the County of Union and State of Oregon, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters thereof, the proposition of adopting or rejecting an act entitled: "An act to provide a revised and consolidated charter of the City of La Grande, in the County of Union, in the State of Oregon," filed in the office of the City Recorder of said City on the 21st day of April, A. D. 1909, and ordained by the city council of said city by Ordinance No. 418 Series 1909, entitled:

"An ordinance ordaining a revised and consolidated charter of the City of La Grande, Oregon, and submitting the same to the legal voters of said city for adoption or rejection at a special election to be held therein on June 22, A. D. 1909," duly passed by the council of said city at a regular meeting thereof on the 21st day of April, A. D. 1909.

Said election will be held and conducted and the returns thereof filed as provided by law in the case of general city election in said city.

The polls at said election will be opened at the hour of 9 o'clock A. M. and closed at the hour of 5 o'clock P. M. on said election day.

The ballot title of the act aforesaid will be prepared by the city attorney and filed with the city recorder of said city, in the manner and time required by the laws of the State of Oregon governing the initiative and referendum in cities and as in the Ordinance aforesaid provided.

All qualified electors of said city will be permitted to vote at said election.

BANNER CELEBRATION IN HISTORY MADE POSSIBLE

The Fourth of July committee met last night and the minutest details for making this year's celebration the grandest ever held in La Grande were arranged. The event will be opened up with 100 guns at 6 o'clock in the morning. Robert Masterson has charge of the salutes and has made all necessary arrangements to fire them at the time designated.

The special train which will carry the Elgin people to La Grande, will leave Elgin at 8 o'clock sharp and will arrive in La Grande at 9, where a rousing reception will be tendered them.

The fireworks which were donated to the committee by the local Japanese is the best and will be the first of its class ever seen here. They consist of 30 pieces, 15 to be shot off at three o'clock in the afternoon and 15 at 9 o'clock at night.

All are requested to bring their basket lunch as there will only be free meat and coffee served. I. W. Faulk has charge of the barbecuing of the meat and there will in all be about 1500 pounds of beef served to

the people.

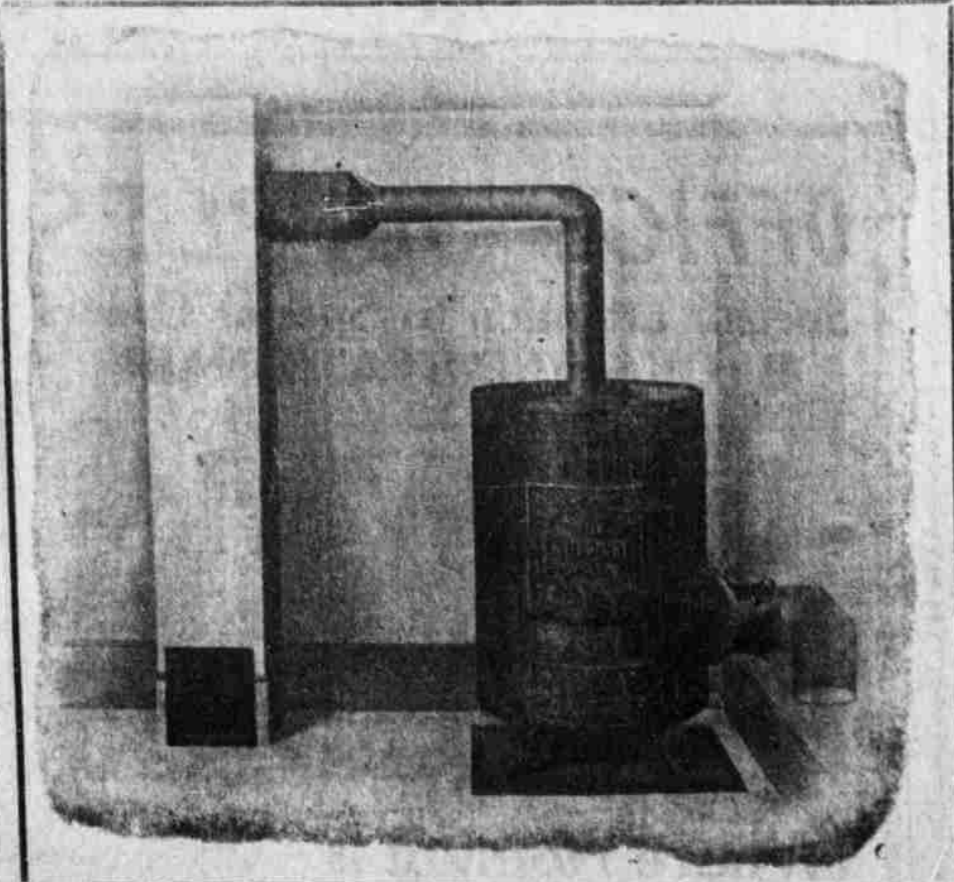
